Note to the Reader:

Since the initial sections of this survey were completed, determinations of eligibility have been modified for certain properties. The determinations of eligibility on the survey forms are superceded by those on the list.

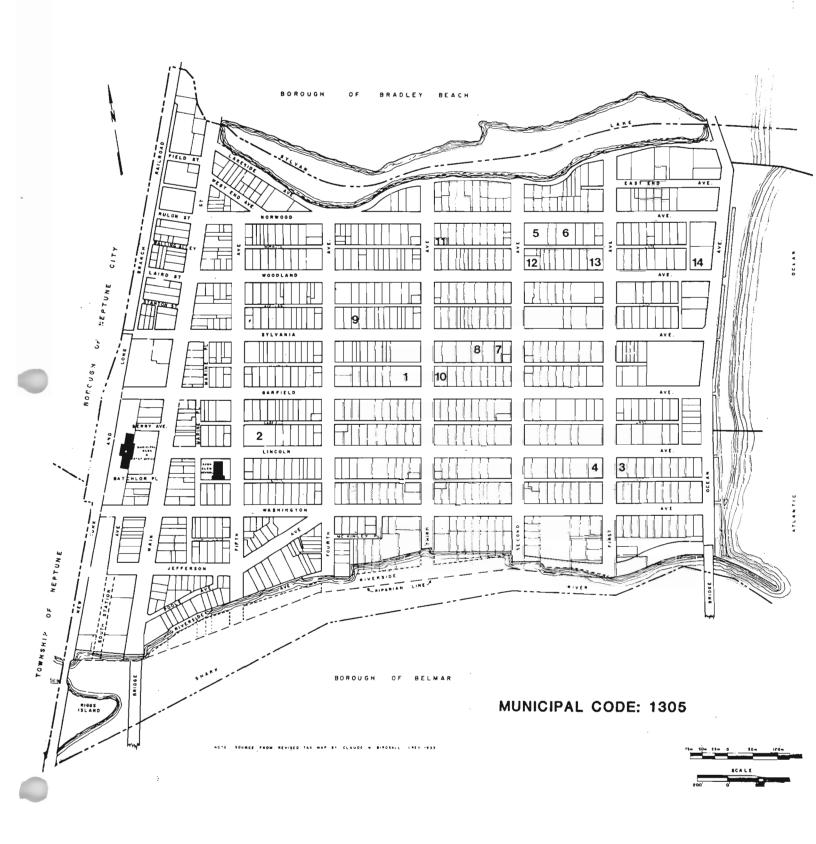

National Register eligibility is subject to review and final approval by the Office of New Jersey Heritage and the New Jersey State Review Board of Historic Sites. Eligibility may change due to building alterations made subsequent to this survey. Since the initial field work for this project was completed during 1980-1982, determinations of eligibility on the survey forms are superceded by those on the below updated lists.
