

	Supplemental Security Income (SSI)	Medicaid Only-Community Care Waiver (CCW)
Overview	Federal income supplement program designed to help people who are "aged, blind, and/or disabled" who have little/no income. SSI provides monthly cash payment to meet basic needs for food, clothing, and shelter.	Special program that provides State Plan Medicaid in addition to home and community based services identified in the CCW to eligible individuals with developmental disabilities who have little/no income. Enrollment into the program is based on availability of a funded slot.
Eligibility Criteria	 Aged (65+); blind; or disabled; & Limited income and resources (<i>The current monthly income limit is \$729.25 & resource limit is \$2000</i>); & U.S. citizen or national, or in one of certain categories of aliens; & Resident of one of the 50-States; D.C. Northern Mariana Islands; & Not absent from the country for 30-consecutive days or more. 	 Eligible for Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) services; & Meet clinical eligibility for ICF/ID level of care; & Determined to be in need of and use a monthly waiver service; & Determined to be blind or disabled by either the Social Security Administration (SSA) or the Division of Medical Assistance and Health Services (DMAHS); & Resident of NJ; & U.S. citizen or national, or in one of certain categories of aliens (<i>Most immigrants who arrive after August 22, 1996 are barred from Medicaid for 5 years</i>); & Limited income and resources (<i>The current monthly income limit is \$2094 & resource limit is \$2000</i>).
Application Process	Made through local Social Security offices. The DDD/Regional CCW staff assists applicants to complete the Medicaid financial packet and is responsible for the submission of the completed packet to the Institutional Services Section (ISS) of Medicaid for eligibility determination. What should I do if I am denied SSI because my income or resources are too high?

You should inquire about your eligibility for Medicaid Only-Community Care Waiver (CCW).

What should I do if I lose my SSI and Medicaid coverage because I begin receiving Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) benefits on my parent's account?

You may be eligible to continue receiving Medicaid benefits as a "Disabled Adult Child" (DAC) if you meet the following criteria: (1) You are at least 18 years old; (2) You have become disabled or blind prior to age 22; (3) You have been receiving SSI on the basis of your disability; and (4) You have lost SSI as a result of child's insurance benefits under Social Security or as a result of an increase in those benefits.

What should I do if I lose my SSI and Medicaid coverage because of receiving SSDI resulting in my income exceeding the SSI income limit?

You may be eligible to continue receiving Medicaid benefits as a DAC (see above). If you have a letter from the Social Security Administration (SSA) verifying that you are eligible for DAC status, take this letter to your County Welfare Agencies (CWA) for consideration of Medicaid eligibility under the DAC status. The CWA should disregard the dollar amount of the children's insurance benefit for Medicaid eligibility and any subsequent increases in the children's insurance benefit. This special eligibility consideration should continue until such time as you are determined to no longer qualify as disabled or blind or you become ineligible for Medicaid because of other income or resources. If you do not have any documentation verifying that you are eligible for DAC status, it is recommended that you contact SSA and obtain a letter prior to going to your CWA.

Once I have been determined eligible for Medicaid, is that determination permanent?

No. If your income, resources or living arrangements have changed, it may affect your eligibility. Additionally, both Medicaid and SSI conduct eligibility redeterminations on an annual basis to verify that you remain eligible. It is imperative that you comply with all redeterminations, as failure to do so may cause your benefits to be suspended or terminated.

If I already have Medicaid, will I automatically be eligible for the Community Care Waiver?

Not necessarily. Some types of Medicaid programs have eligibility criteria unique to that program. If you have another form of Medicaid you may be required to complete a Medicaid Financial Application for the CCW program, which will be reviewed by the Institutional Services Section (ISS) at Medicaid. However, if you are an SSI recipient, and have been determined by DDD to meet the clinical eligibility requirements for the CCW, you will not be required to complete the Medicaid Financial Application.

If I lose my CCW Medicaid eligibility, will I still be able to access DDD services through the Community Care Waiver?

No, you will not be able to access services through the Community Care Waiver unless you maintain Medicaid eligibility.

What should I do if I am enrolled in the Supports program or another Medicaid home and community-based services waiver program, but am in need of services through the CCW?

The Division of Developmental Disabilities (Division) currently maintains a Waiting List for the Community Care Waiver. In order to be eligible to enroll on the CCW, you have to either reach the top of that waiting list or meet the emergency criteria as established by the Division. Additionally, you can only participate in one Medicaid home and community-based services waiver program at a time. If you are on another waiver program and reach the top of the CCW Waiting List or are deemed an emergency, you will need to dis-enroll from the other program. Before doing so, you should also contact your care/case manager from the other waiver program and inquire about what services you may lose if you choose to no longer participate in that waiver program.
