STATE OF NEW JERSEY

I, Anne Milgram, Attorney General of the State of New Jersey, do hereby certify: (1) That all State laws and regulations governing vehicle size and weight are being enforced on those highways which, prior to October 1, 1991, were designated as part of the Federal-aid Primary, Federal-aid Secondary, or Federal-aid Urban Systems; (2) That the State is enforcing the freeze provisions of the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 [23 U.S.C. 127(d) and 49 U.S.C. 31112]; and (3) That all State laws governing vehicle weight on the Interstate System are consistent with 23 U.S.C. 127 (a) and (b).

GOVERNOR'S DESIGNATED OFFICIAL

A letter from the Governor of the State of New Jersey designating the Attorney General as the primary official to submit this certification is included as Appendix A.

BUDGET/FINES AND PENALTIES

New Jersey's annual budget for size and weight related activities for Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2009 was \$17,182,000 and the amount collected as a result of imposition of fines and penalties provided by statute for violations of size and weight laws was \$346,030.

JURISDICTION

The Division of State Police had jurisdiction over the entire state which includes the urban areas.

LEGISLATION AND REGULATIONS

During FFY 2009, there were no legislative or regulatory matters pertaining to the vehicle size and weight program.

ENFORCEMENT

The Size and Weight Enforcement Plan anticipated the use of four permanent truck scales in FFY 2009. The permanent truck scales were located in Carney's Point Township, Salem County on I-295, northbound; Piscataway Township, Middlesex County on I-287, northbound; Knowlton Township, Warren County on I-80, eastbound; and in Greenwich Township, Warren County on I-78, eastbound and westbound, .

In addition to the permanent scales, the Division of State Police continued to use portable scales. A total of 172 Haenni scales or 86 sets were used for enforcement efforts during the year.

The Commercial Carrier/Safety Inspection Unit (North and South) within the Division of State Police continued to be responsible for the enforcement of overweight and dimensional laws. Fifty-two (52) individuals are assigned to the Unit, 28 in North Jersey and 24 in South Jersey, along with six administrative staff.

The State had estimated for FFY 2009 that 758,675 vehicles would be weighed and/or screened by Weigh-In-Motion (WIM) and 3,050 citations would be issued. The number of vehicles weighed and/or screened by WIM in FFY 2009 totaled 1,006,749 compared to 1,096,480 in FFY 2008. The number of citations issued in FFY 2009 totaled 1,430 compared to 2,020 in FFY 2008.

In the FFY 2009 Enforcement Plan, the State had established short and long term goals to support and maintain its enforcement program. The following is presented as a comparison of goals versus actual results.

I-80, Knowlton Township	The NJ Department of Transportation (NJDOT) continues to pursue final authorization allowing the use of Federal funds for construction. The I-80 truck scale is scheduled to be rebuilt with three scale pads, thereby increasing the number of scale pads currently on site by two. In addition, an inspection building will be added with construction scheduled to begin in 2010.						
I-287	NJDOT will pursue a site located in Franklin Lakes for a new permanent weigh station. Construction is not expected to begin for several years.						
Develop and implement an off-loading procedure as an enforcement practice at permanent weigh stations.	Off-loading is not currently practiced in the State. The Division of Sate Police and the Attorney General will continue to review any viable operational plan brought to their attention in an effort to achieve an off-loading procedure.						

NJDOT continued to collect truck weight and vehicle classification data for a variety of planning and pavement design purposes using permanent WIM systems. These systems were used for the collection of data and do not meet the statutory or regulatory requirements to be certified for use in enforcement.

NJDOT maintained 59 WIM locations during the fiscal year.

SELF EVALUATION

The State's size and weight enforcement program continued to produce positive results in FFY 2009. For a second consecutive year, over one million vehicles were either weighed by permanent/portable scales or screened by WIM equipment. Although the gross number of vehicles weighed decreased slightly from the previous year, as did the number of citations issued, the program remains effective in protecting the public from safety risks associated with overweight trucks.

The positive numbers generated by the size and weight enforcement program over the past several years is indicative of the commitment on the part of both the Division of State Police and Department of Transportation. The addition of the permanent weigh stations on I-78 in Greenwich Township and the pending reconstruction project on I-80 in Knowlton Township, scheduled to begin in 2010, ensures the protection of roads and bridges and increased public safety for years to come.
