## I. Executive Summary



The rate of alcohol-related fatalities in New Jersey is traditionally below the national average. However, the horrendous toll of impaired driving in the state is still felt on a daily basis, despite years of enforcement and educational programs.

For the first time in 2005 the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety mobilized the entire law enforcement community in the state for an impaired driving campaign as part of the national You Drink and Drive, You Lose Crackdown. The crackdown, which ran from August 19-September 5, 2005, and

focused on the Labor Day holiday weekend, called on law enforcement to conduct high-visibility drunk driving checkpoints and roving patrols during the two-week campaign.

As usual, the law enforcement community in the state rose to the occasion and sent a strong message that impaired driving will not be tolerated on the roads of New Jersey and that efforts will continue until drunk driving is completely eradicated.

Highlights of New Jersey's You Drink and Drive, You Lose 2005 Crackdown are as follows:

A total of 382 police agencies participated in the two-week crackdown compared to 102 in 2004.

102 law enforcement agencies received You Drink and Drive You Lose campaign grants from the Division of Highway Traffic Safety to assist in carrying out the campaign.

A total of 1,583 DWI arrests were made during the two-week crackdown compared to 316 in 2004.

The total number of summonses (Open Container, Traffic Signal, Speeding, Seat Belt, Child Restraint, Equipment, Other Moving, Other Non Moving) issued during the campaign was 50,665 compared to 13,020 in 2004.

There were 11,672 speeding summonses and 5,739 seat belt citations issued during the two-week period.

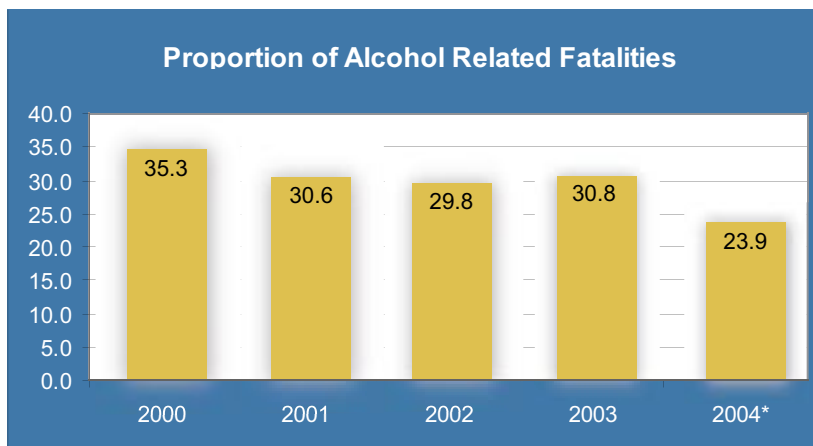
The campaign was supported by public awareness activities that included radio announcements and news conference events in the New York City and Philadelphia media markets.

## II. Background

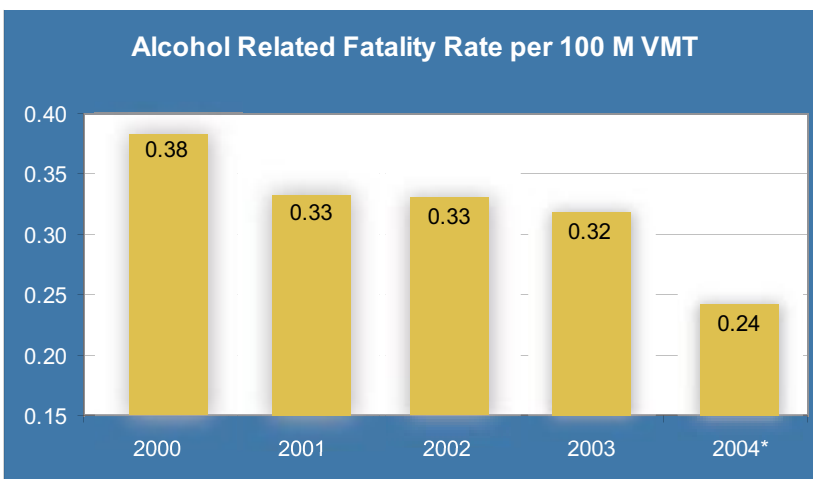
Tremendous strides have been made in the last 25 years in the war against impaired driving. Whereas “one for the road” was once socially acceptable, society has come realize the devastating toll of impaired driving. A coalition of law enforcement, community activists, and governmental officials have worked for the better part of two decades to dramatically reduce the number of impaired drivers on our nation’s roads.

Nonetheless, the work is surely not done as driving while under the influence continues to be a scourge on our roadways. Preliminary estimates from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) indicate that alcohol-related fatalities declined in 2004 for the second straight year, however the number of impaired driving deaths still topped 17,000. In addition, more than 1.4 million motorists were arrested nationwide in 2003 for driving while under the influence, the most recent full year for which such numbers are available.

In addition, 97% of those surveyed indicate that they feel impaired driving is a major threat to themselves and their families. Also, the vast majority of Americans support stronger drunk driving laws. NHTSA estimates that three in every ten Americans will be involved in an impaired driving crash at some point in their lifetime.

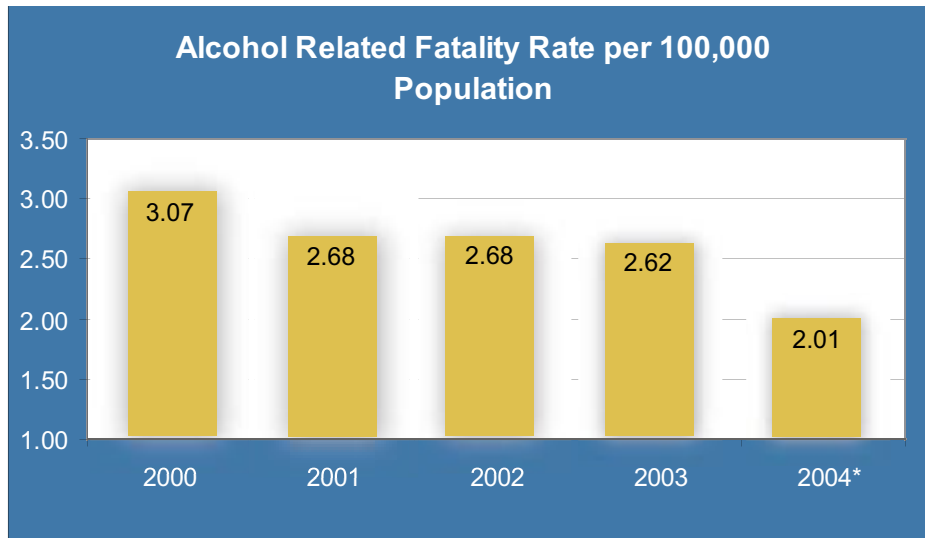
Planning for New Jersey’s You Drink and Drive, You Lose 2005 Crackdown began in late 2004, when a detailed plan of action and timeline was developed. The plan of action was used to carry out all components of the campaign, including the development and distribution and educational materials, the soliciting and processing of grant applications, outreach to all police agencies to secure participation in the crackdown, and the earned media component of the program.

All 475 police agencies in New Jersey were asked to participate in the 2005 You Drink and Drive, You Lose Crackdown on either a funded or non-funded basis. Based on available funding levels, approximately 100 departments were offered You Drink and Drive, You Lose grants to support efforts locally. Along with the letters of invitation, grant packets, and educational materials, each de-

partment received a crackdown enforcement reporting form to be filled out and returned prior to September 17, 2005.

Agencies that received You Drink and Drive, You Lose Crackdown grants were awarded \$4,000, which provided funding for 80 hours of enforcement overtime during the crackdown period. The funding was to be utilized by the grantees for DWI checkpoints and/or roving patrols.

**III. Results**

When all reporting forms and data were tabulated, it was determined that 382 police agencies had participated in the campaign, which is a dramatic increase as compared to the 102 agencies that participated in 2004, and the 55 that took part in 2003.

As the result of this concerted effort to elicit participation from the local departments, the response to the crackdown effort was greater than ever before. A total of 382 police departments participated. This represents 80.4% percent of the total police agencies in the state.

The table that follows summarizes the results of the enforcement component of the campaign. During the two-week You Drink and Drive, You Lose 2005 Crackdown, the 382 participating police departments made 1,583 DWI arrests. They also issued 11,672 speeding summonses, 5,739 seat belt citations, and 33,254 other citations.

#### IV. Media



It is important to remember that any statewide traffic safety enforcement crackdown needs to be supported by a strong campaign of public information and awareness. The Division, in cooperation with its law enforcement partners, raised awareness about the 2005 You Drink and Drive, You Lose Crackdown in several important ways.

A pair of news conference were held, one in each of the major media markets serving the state, to raise awareness about the campaign. The crackdown was formally launched at a press conference held in Times Square, New York City, on August 22, 2005. Speakers at the event included the Administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Dr. Jeffrey Runge. The New Jersey Attorney General, Peter C. Harvey held a

second news conference, targeting the Philadelphia media market, was held in Pennsauken, NJ on August 25, 2005. Both media events were well covered by television, radio, and print journalists, which served to raise awareness about the DWI crackdown.

Thousands of radio listeners heard the You Drink and Drive, You Lose message courtesy of radio announcements produced by the Division and aired before and during the campaign. The announcements ran repeatedly on every New Jersey radio station as part of the Division's ongoing partnership with the New Jersey Broadcasters Association.

Participating police agencies also helped spread the word. Grant recipients were asked to send out press releases highlighting their participation in the campaign as well as hang banners around their communities to promote the crackdown. Dozens of news stories ran in local newspapers as a result of these press releases, which undoubtedly brought the impaired driving message to many thousands of residents.



# Police localize nationwide DWI campaign

**NORTH ARLINGTON** – The police department is teaming up with hundreds of other law enforcement agencies for the nationwide campaign “You Drink and Drive You Lose.”

The program, which was

created by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration in 1999, will provide departments, like North Arlington, with funding which they will use to step up law enforcement from the summer weeks of Aug. 19 to Sept.

Summer months are filled with get-togethers, barbecues, backyard parties, late nights and summer recess for children.

With all of this free time,

the chances of teenage and adult drivers to be in an either an alcohol-related or non-alcohol related accident is increased exponentially, according to surveys conducted by the Students Against Destructive Decisions and Liberty Financial.

The statistics for the past year showed alcohol-related deaths fell 2.4 percent, to 16,694 from 17,105. The overall death total on U.S. highways declined as

well, dropping from 42,884 in 2003 to 42,636, a 0.6 percent decrease, according to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

The campaign is being pushed during the summer months because of past statistics, which show drastic increases in DWI related traffic incidents, according to Lt. John Hearn of the North Arlington Police Department. He also said this is the time of the year

people should be most careful when driving at night.

Hearn believes programs like these help cap and prevent fatal accidents from happening. According to a report made last week by the D.O.T., alcohol-related fatalities dropped in 2004.

“I definitely believe that programs like these are working,” said Hearn. “People, number one, are getting arrested more for it. Programs like these are making people more aware, therefore making the numbers go down.”

“Drivers are safer today on our nation’s highways than they have ever been, in part, because of the safer cars, higher safety belt use and stronger safety laws,” Transportation Secretary Norman Y. Mineta said in last week’s statement.

The campaign was developed to become a

“voice of an energized national partnership,” with hopes of deterring drunk driving incidents. The program is a partnership of the National Association of Governors Highway Safety Representatives, Operation C.A.R.E., the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the National Sheriffs Association and the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives. President of the Association of Chiefs of Police Ronald Neubauser said in a statement that awareness is most helpful when dealing with alcohol abuse.

“By increasing public awareness and maximizing the visibility of the state and provincial police, through these enforcement periods, we will reduce the incidence of drivers under the influence,” Neubauser said.

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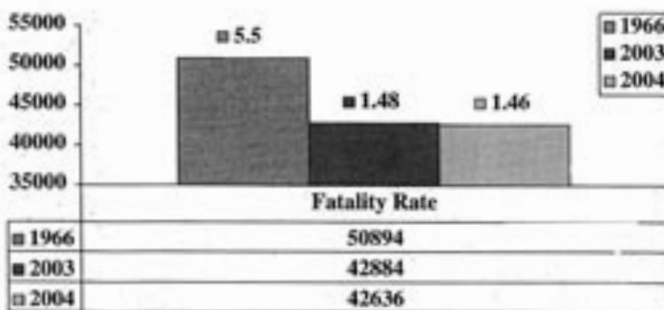

# Police crack down on DWI

Local police are stepping up drunken driving enforcement as part of a "You Drink & Drive, You Lose 2005" national crackdown. This means the borough gets additional funds to cover extra duty hours from Aug. 19 to Sept. 5.

The end of the summer season is marked by a time of social gatherings and high alcohol consumption. This program raises awareness about the dangers of drinking and driving through high visibility enforcement. It also means more police are available to arrest drivers who are impaired by alcohol or drugs.

According to the National

Highway Traffic Safety Administration, impaired drivers kill nearly 18,000 people in the United States each year and in New Jersey 39 percent of the motor vehicle fatalities are alcohol related. A NHTSA poll showed that nearly 97 percent of the respondents viewed drinking and driving by others as a threat to their families and themselves.

The Tenafly Police Department offered the following advice:

- Be responsible and don't risk it. You will be caught.
- If you plan to drink, choose a designated driver before you go out.
- Take a taxicab, a bus or ask a

sober friend to drive you home.

■ Spend the night where the activity is held.

■ Report impaired drivers to the police.

■ Buckle Up! It's your best defense against an impaired driver.

"The summer season is a time for fun with friends and family, not tragedy," said Roberto Rodriguez, NHTSA director. "New Jersey law enforcement agencies are committed to eradicating impaired drivers from our roads."

## Cops set up sobriety checks

The Jersey City Police Department has launched "You Drink, You Drive, You Lose," a program aimed at cracking down on impaired driving, officials said.

"We encourage anyone planning on drinking to be responsible and designate a sober driver," Police Chief Robert Troy said. "With sobriety checkpoints and saturation patrols, chances are if you are impaired, you will be arrested."

# Sherman takes top school job

"Tenaflly meets my personal and professional goals," said Dr. Morton Sherman, who has been named new school superintendent after a six-month search.

Having chosen Tenaflly because this is "a community that values high educational achievement," Sherman is expected to begin work here Dec. 12.

Sherman, 55, was superintendent of Cherry Hill Schools for eight years. He brings experience, expertise and excellence to Tenaflly.

## Police department gets two grants

**ELMWOOD PARK** – The police department recently received some new weapons to help in the fight against drugs and alcohol.

Through the "You Drink and Drive, You Lose" national program, the borough will receive a \$4,000 grant to combat drunk driving. The New Jersey Division of Highway and Safety will reimburse the grant money to help offset overtime costs for officers, who will be conducting stationary DWI checkpoints and random patrols.

"We do random patrols on a regular basis, but we haven't done checkpoints in a while," Police Chief Don Ingrasselino said. "[The checkpoints] are usually done with 10 officers and they will stop every fourth or fifth vehicle."

According to a press release from the police department, the borough council will adopt a resolution supporting the grant in the near future.

## North Arlington

On Aug. 27, while working the special DWI patrol "You Drink and Drive, You lose" an officer noticed a vehicle traveling in excess of the speed limit and almost colliding with a curb as it was traveling on Belleville Turnpike. The officer activated his emergency lights and attempted to stop the vehicle, at which time the vehicle fled. The driver of the vehicle, James Mathers, 41, of Kearny, parked the vehicle on Beach Street in Kearny. He exited the vehicle and ran into a residence. The officer in pursuit elected not to follow because there was a large dog on the porch of the house. A warrant for eluding and obstructing was subsequently issued. The Kearny Police Department arrested Mathers on a North Arlington warrant, and he was subsequently released on bail.

## Wayne Police will be active in upcoming anti-DWI campaign

This cross-country crusade is designed to make people think before deciding to mix driving and drink.

From Aug. 18 to Sept. 5, area law enforcement will be out in force for the "You Drink You Drive You Lose 2005" crackdown, originally started in 1999. Nationwide, police departments will be dedicating extra resources to anti-driving while intoxicated (DWI) details as Labor Day approaches, according to the state Division of Highway Traffic Safety (DHITS).

Citizens are being asked to consider the following before heading to an alcoholic beverage function: Choose a designated driver before going out. Take mass transit, a taxicab, or ask a sober friend to drive you home. Spend the night where the affair is held. Always buckle up as a defense against a potential DWI caused collision. And, report intoxicated motorists to police as soon as safely possible by cell phone.

In a release, Roberto Rodriguez — DHITS director — said the campaign is aimed at protecting the byways from under the influence motorists.

"The summer season is a time for fun with friends and family, not tragedy. The law enforcement community of the state is committed to eradicating impaired driving from our roads."

The Passaic County Sheriff's Department (PCSD) will have special units in strategic areas throughout the county, according to Bill Maer, a PCSD spokesperson.

"It's more patrolling areas that have had a higher degree or crashes in the past. We are not going to do checkpoints this year."

Maer said county officers would be watching for irregular traffic pattern vehicles. Around the holidays, he said, DWI incidents tend to spike.

On a related note, the spokesperson said the PCSD's patrol division — throughout the year — aggressively goes after intoxicated drivers, as well as other moving violators. For 2004, he said, the department's DWI tally

was 156. As of Aug. 12, he said, this year's count stood at 135.

"I think we're going to surpass last year's number."

In addition, Wayne Police will also be active in the campaign. Sometime during that initiative, officers plan to do a stationary checkpoint at an undisclosed location. Uniforms will also canvass the township in marked/unmarked cruisers for impaired operators, according to Lt. Paul Dring, Wayne Police Traffic Bureau Commander.

"We're going to be active during

those two weeks with roving patrols."

Dring said the Wayne police's enforcement efforts are being supplemented through a state DHITS grant.

In Totowa, authorities are also gearing up for participation in the coast-to-coast anti-DWI sweep.

"We're involved. We're going to do something with check points or roving patrols."

In West Paterson, police will be targeting drunken drivers in marked cars, including one stealth unit. The department, he said, will

be using grant funds to step up its presence, according to Capt. Anthony Galletti, the department's traffic officer.

Galletti said the counter-DWI deployment is designed to deter people from alcohol-affected motoring. Publicity about the clampdown, he said, has been on the public's mind, a key drunk driving prevention factor.

"It definitely makes for more awareness, just like the seat belt campaign. Everyone is talking about it."

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## Getting the point: Checkpoints serve as major deterrent

TOMS RIVER — The number of drunken drivers getting caught in DWI checkpoints is decreasing. Are they no longer serving a purpose?

Not on your life, say law enforcement officials.

"Without a doubt the number of designated drivers we see have increased," said John Mount, a sergeant in the Ocean County Prosecutor's Office, early yesterday morning. He said about 15 of the drivers he interviewed were designated drivers.

13 Dover police officers and two members of the police Emergency Medical Service conducted a roadside DWI checkpoint on Route 37. They started directing traffic off the highway at 11:15 p.m. Friday. When they finished at 3 a.m. Saturday they processed nearly 1,500 vehicles.

Of the 1,500 drivers they spoke with, police arrested one man for drunk driving, one for outstanding warrants and issued a couple of motor vehicle summonses. One of those summonses

was for a man who had a falsified driver's license from California. He was charged with driving without a license, said Police Chief Michael Mastronardy.

To Roberto Rodriguez, the director of the state Division of Highway Traffic Safety who observed the checkpoint, the lone DWI arrest says the message is getting out to drivers.

"As long as people are becoming aware of what we are doing, that's a deterrent," he said. "As long as they stop drunk driving I think it's money well spent."

Rodriguez's office distributes federal grants to county prosecutor's offices around the state to fund the checkpoints.

He said 102 municipalities received the Drunk Driving Enforcement Grants this year but an additional 232 towns voluntarily set up DWI check points.

The average cost for a DWI check point is \$4,000, he said. That pays the wages of the police officers who are working during overtime hours as well as for the support equipment that is staged around the checkpoint.

Motorists who are found guilty of DWI pay a \$100 surcharge to the state in addition to their penalty, he said. Each town receives \$95 of that surcharge to be used for their police department, he said.

DWI checkpoints must follow a rigid set of guidelines, said Lt. Mitch Little, who conducted the stop.

Police must notify the public with ads in the media. They must also file a plan of action with the prosecutor's office.

Police diverted all three lanes of Route 37 traffic into the Salvation Army parking lot. Vehicles were directed to two lanes, where groups of four were interviewed for about 90 seconds.

Police officers identified themselves to the drivers, asked the drivers if they were drinking and then distributed a pamphlet detailing the penalties for drunk driving offenses. Police also inspected for seat-belt law compliance and child-seat placement.

If an officer suspected a driver was intoxicated, he directed the driver to pull off to the side and a further interview was conducted. At that point if a driver was impaired, the officer made an arrest and the suspect was taken to police headquarters for further testing and the vehicle was impounded, said Little.

Police cars were stationed several blocks before the check point to intercept any vehicles that might try to drive around the checkpoint.

"As long as you don't back up traffic or inconvenience people, most don't mind," he said.

There were even the occasional "thank you's" from drivers who told police they were appreciative of their efforts to keep drunk drivers off the road.

Since Ocean County began setting up the check points, the number of fatal car accidents in the county has gone down, said Steven M. Janosko, assistant prosecutor.

He has taken part in DWI checkpoints for 21 years, he said.

In that time, he said people have become more aware of the problem of drunk driving and enforcement of the law has become more consistent.

"For a while, checkpoints were not that popular," he said, "but they have become effective for enforcement and they have become effective for education. It brings visibility to the issue."

"This is my area of specialization," he said. "I like to think it's important. It's one of the few areas of law enforcement where you can be proactive and have some level of deterrence."

At the end of the checkpoint, Rodriguez said he was pleased with the results and pleased with the police officers who conducted the checkpoint.

"There was no resentment from the drivers and many of them thanked the officers," he said.

"It's a win-win situation," he said. "We get the drunk drivers off the road for their own safety and we make the roads safe for the other drivers."

## V. Conclusion
