The History of the New Jersey National Guard (Part 5)

Civil War

The fall of Fort Sumter and President Lincoln's call for aid from the several states, found the militia almost totally unprepared. The legislature had made no provisions to equip, arm, and train the militia. For years, individual patriotism and local funds supported the militia, with little or no encouragement from the State. Year after year reports of the Adjutant General depicted neglect, indifference, and the impossibility to meet the responsibilities of military training. General Thomas Cadwalader, from 1848 to 1856, complained of this neglect but at the same time, unwittingly demonstrated the consistently high calibre of the men who headed New Jersey's Military Department.

A great engineer and artilleryman, General Cadwalader, had gone to Europe to inspect the improved ordnance of the French, Prussian, and Austrian armies. Quick to realize the potential of grooved barrels in both muskets and artillery which he saw in Europe, he go reported to both Governor Rodman M. Price of New Jersey and the Federal government urging the adoption of the new weapons by American military forces.

In his final report to the governor in 1857, General Cadwalader said, "The adoption of the grooved bore is about to create a new era in modern warfare. From its long-range and unerring aim, it is certain to place irregular troops on a more equal footing with the veteran soldier..."

The first-call for troops was made on April 15, 1861, requiring that four regiments be detached from the state militia to serve in Federal Service. The first militia unit actually received and mustered was the "Olden Guard" of Trenton.

Despite the lack of preparedness, the First New Jersey Brigade, responding to the call of The President for troops, was the first complete organization to reach and participate in the defense of the National Capital.

The lack of a provision in a Federal Law for extended military service in national defense prevented the retention of the 1st brigade and the troops to New Jersey for mustering out of service at the expiration of a three month tour of duty. However, the majority of the officers and men of this first muster (mobilization) formed the nucleus of the 38 regiments raised in New Jersey for the Civil War.

In the four-year period from April, 1861, to April, 1865, New Jersey furnished a total of 79,348 men for service. New Jersey Regiments participated in every major engagement and, in every campaign from the Potomac to the Wilderness, to Florida, to the West. The heroic figures are too numerous to list, but names like Kearney, Mott, Kilpatrick, McAllister, Karge, Hexamer, Clark, Stryker are but the highlights in a broad canvass of courage and daring.

One notable event occurred in June 1863 when General Robert F. Lee invaded Pennsylvania. The governor of that state appealed to New Jersey for aid in defending the capital at Harrisburg. The

For information or to make a donation, call 609-530-7049 call issued by the Governor was promptly answered, and Company A, Company B, and Company C of the National Guard of Trenton, and Company D, National Guard of Lambertville, were placed under the command of Colonel William R. Murphy and sent to Harrisburg. They were assigned to guard and protect various bridges on the Susquehanna. While they did not participate directly in the battle of Gettysburg, other New Jersey Regiments and Artillery fought there.

The History of Black History

Americans have recognized black history annually since 1926, first as "Negro History Week" and later as "Black History Month."

What you might not know is that black history had barely begun to be studied-or even documented when the tradition originated. Although blacks have been in America at least as far back as colonial times, it was not until the 20th century that they gained a respectable presence in the history books.

We owe the celebration of Black History Month, and more importantly, the study of black history, to Dr. Carter G. Woodson. Born to parents who were former slaves, he spent his childhood working in the Kentucky coal mines and later enrolling in high school at the age of twenty. He graduated within two years and later went on to earn a Ph.D. from Harvard. Woodson was disturbed to find in his studies that history books largely ignored the black American population and when blacks did figure into the picture, it was generally in ways that reflected the inferior social position they were assigned at the time.

Woodson, always one to act on his ambitions, decided to take on the challenge of writing black Americans into the nation's history. He established the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (now called the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History) in 1915, and a year later founded the widely respected Journal of Negro History. In 1926, Woodson launched Negro History Week as an initiative to bring national attention to the contributions of black people throughout American history.

Woodson chose the second week of February for Negro History Week because it marks the birthdays of two men who greatly influenced the black American population, Frederick Douglas and Abraham Lincoln. February has much more than Douglass and Lincoln to show for its significance in black American history. For example:

February 23, 1868: W. E. B. DuBois, important civil rights leader and co-founder of the NAACP, was born.

February 3, 1870: The 15th Amendment was passed, granting blacks the right to vote.

February 25, 1870: The first black U.S. senator, Hiram R. Revels (1822-1901), took his oath of office

February 12, 1909: The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) was founded by a group of concerned black and white citizens in New York City.

February 1, 1960: In what would become a civil-rights movement milestone, a group of black Greensboro, N.C., college students began a sit-in at a segregated Woolworth's lunch counter.

February 21, 1965: Malcolm X, the militant leader who promoted Black Nationalism, was shot to death by three Black Muslims.

Bill Extends Education Eligibility

A bill which extends eligibility for higher education tuition assistance to certain former members of New Jersey National Guard and increases the number of tuition-free credits available to National Guard members and their dependents was signed into law by Governor Jon. S. Corzine on Jan. 24.

The legislation would allow National Guard members who are called into active duty to utilize state tuition assistance credits after their enlistment expires.

Under the old law, active members of the New Jersey National Guard may receive up to 15 credits per semester tuition free from public institutions of higher education in the State. Similarly, the child or surviving spouse of a National Guard member killed in the performance of his duties may also receive this benefit.

This bill, A-2542, amended the law to extend eligibility for this higher education tuition benefit to

The change would permit these soldiers to receive their earned educational benefits should their enlistment expire, or should they be medically discharged, prior to completing their studies.

The new law will also increase the number of credits eligible for funding under this program from 15 to 16 per semester.

Microsoft software available for Army Guardsmen

The Microsoft Home Use Program (HUP) is eligible to all Army personnel including, active duty, reserve, Guard, and civilians currently employed by the Army.

The program allows individuals to get a licensed copy of Microsoft Office desktop applications to install and use on a home computer.

The Army awarded a six – year Enterprise License Agreement (ELA) for Microsoft products on May 30, 2003. The MS ELA established by the Army is a "Volume License" agreement with Software Assurance, and as a "Volume License" owner, the Army is entitled to exercise the Home Use Program.

Army Guard members taking advantage of this offering are responsible for paying the administrative costs for obtaining the software and may use the software as desired. Guard members can only obtain one version of the software at any given time.

Army Emergency Relief: Provides emergency financial assistance to active duty military personnel, retirees, National Guard and Reserve Component on active duty for over 30 consecutive days and their family members (with ID card and power of attorney).

Exceptional Family Member Program (EFMP): Entitles member to additional benefits through TRICARE's Extended Care Health Option (ECHO) Program. Provides information, referrals, crisis intervention, community support and assistance to meet individual needs.

Family Advocacy Program: Provides for the identification, reporting, prevention, and treatment of child abuse and domestic violence.

Employment Readiness Program: Offers information and referral for employment, education (resume writing and interviewing), volunteer and training opportunities.

Free SAT/ACT Offer Extended

NJDSM recipient receives Legion of Honor in Washington, D.C., Ceremony"

James J. Sheeran, one of the first New Jerseyans to receive the New Jersey Distinguished Service Medal, was honored by the Republic of France at a ceremony and dinner reception at the French Ambassador's residence, in Washington, D.C., on Jan. 31.

More than sixty of Jim Sheeran's friends and relatives attended the ceremony and were then Ambassador Jean-David Levitte's guests for dinner at his residence. Representing the State of New Jersey at the event was Gary R. Englert, the Director of the Division of Veterans Services, of the New Jersey Department of Military and Veterans Affairs, who presented congratulations on behalf of Maj. Gen. Glenn K. Rieth, The Adjutant General.

Ambassador Levitte, recounted Sheeran's extraordinary exploits during World War II, and presented him with the medallion signifying his being named a Chevalier of the Order of the Legion of Honor. Established by Napoleon Bonaparte and first awarded in 1804, The Legion of Honor recognizes individuals for their extraordinary contributions to the French Republic.

Ambassador Levitte recounted the incredible saga of Jim Sheeran, who served as Mayor from 1958 to 1966, grew up in the Township and graduated from West Orange High School in 1942. His father Jack, who saw service in Europe during World War I, returned home from that conflict with a French bride, the former Lucy Muniere. Jack and Lucy Sheeran would later move to West Orange and raise their family on Collamore Terrace. That Jim Sheeran's mother was a French national would have considerable consequence during his wartime exploits.

As did so many others of his generation, Sheeran enlisted in the United States Army, after his high school graduation. Volunteering for the Paratroops, he jumped on Normandy, France with the 101st Airborne Division, in the pre-dawn hours before D-day, June 6, 1944. Separated from his unit and finding himself alone and in a swamp, Sheeran was captured by German soldiers late in the day on June 6. Paraded like a trophy through the streets of Paris by the Nazis, Sheeran was placed on a railroad car, with other Allied prisoners, for transport to POW camps in Germany.

It was at this point that Jim Sheeran's wartime odyssey became truly remarkable. In concert with four other paratrooper-POWs, Sheeran managed to kick open the boarded up window of the wooden cattle car in which they were riding. Believing they had already entered Germany, the five men jumped off the train. Three of the five were shot, and presumably killed, by the German soldiers "riding shotgun" on top of the railcars. Sheeran and another paratrooper, a Native-American named Bernie Rainwater, managed to escape unharmed.

Without benefit of a map or compass, Sheeran and Rainwater began heading in a southerly direction, through German occupied France, hoping to reach the border of neutral Switzerland. Along the way, they contacted members of the Maquis (the French Resistance), instructed resistance members on the use of American weaponry that had been air-dropped to them and also assisted them in clandestine military operations. Separated from their new French comrades during one of these operations, the two paratroopers continued their journey south.

Through sheer luck and having traversed a total of nearly 130 miles through occupied territory, the two made their way to the village where Jim Sheeran's mother was raised, Donremy, France. Never having been there, and not speaking the language, Sheeran realized where they were from the Mirabelle fruit trees his mother had told him about, which were unique to that part of France.

Again intercepted by members of the Resistance, Sheeran and Rainwater were taken to a village elder: an eighty-year old woman who had taught Sheeran's mother as a school girl. She instantly recognized the family resemblance in Jim's brilliant blue eyes and confirmed that this was the son of Lucy Muniere. Now united with cousins he had never met, Jim Sheeran, and Bernie Rainwater would be safeguarded by the people of Donremy until the allied advance reached the area in September 1944.

Perhaps the most remarkable part of this stranger-than-fiction story is the fact that Donremy is also the birthplace and childhood home of Joan of Arc, the Patron Saint of Soldiers. The stone hut in the woods, in which Sheeran and Rainwater were often hidden, was, as legend would have it, Joan of Arc's girlhood home.

Repatriated by American Forces on Sept. 15, 1944, Sheeran and Rainwater were immediately returned to England. As an escaped prisoner of war, Jim was given the opportunity to return home but opted to rejoin his unit. Within a day, he was back in combat, having jumped on Eindhoven, Holland with the 101st Airborne Division in Operation Market-Garden. Sheeran would remain with the "Screaming Eagles" through the siege at Bastogne, where he was wounded in combat.

Among Mr. Sheeran's military decorations are the Combat Infantry Badge, the Parachutist Badge (with two combat jump stars), the Bronze Star Medal, the Purple Heart and the Presidential Unit Citation.

Following the war, Sheeran completed college and law school, joined the Federal Bureau of Investigation as a Special Agent and then began a private law practice. In 1958, at the age of thirty-two, he was elected the youngest Mayor in West Orange's history and served two terms. In 1974, Sheeran was appointed as the Commissioner of Insurance, by then Governor Brendan T. Byrne, and served in that capacity until 1984. He is an acknowledged expert in the field of automobile insurance and currently serves as the Chairman and Chief Operating Officer of NJCURE, the state's largest reciprocal insurance consortium.
