

Bluegill Sunfish

Lepomis macrochirus



Description:

- large black spot on rear of dorsal fin
- 5 to 9 dark vertical bars on deep, compressed body
- long pointed pectoral fins
- black spot on rear edge of gill cover
- iridescent blue color on lower jaw and gill
- color ranges from olive black back with yellow belly to blue green back with white belly

Size:

♦ up to 16.25 inches

Range:

- Native to St. Lawrence Great Lakes and Mississippi River basins from Quebec and New York to Minnesota and south to Gulf of Mexico
- Atlantic and Gulf Slope drainages from Virginia to Rio Grande, Texas and New Mexico; North Mexico; introduced over much of the U.S.


Facts:

- prefer quiet, warm waters with a lot of vegetation to hide in
- young fish frequent shallow, weedy waters near the shore
- adults prefer deeper water during the day and shallow water at night
- feed mostly on aquatic and terrestrial insects, insect larvae and crustaceans, but will
- also eat vegetation, small fish, snails and mollusks
- ♦ feed all day long
