

Longear Sunfish

Lepomis megalotis



Description:

- olive to rusty brown back
- ♦ yellow to orange-red belly
- blue-green bars on the sides of its head
- back and sides with specks of yellow-orange, emerald and blue
- elongated opercular flap gives the 'long ear' appearance
- females slightly smaller than males
- males are generally brighter and have a larger opercular flap
- ♦ 13-14 pectoral rays
- ♦ 9-10 anal rays

Size:

• up to 9.5 inches, usually 4-4.5 inches

Range:

 east to central North America; from southern Quebec and Ontario through the Eastern U.S. and west to Oklahoma, Texas and northeastern Mexico

Facts:

- often mistaken as a pumpkinseed
- likes vegetation in rocky and sandy pools of creeks and small to medium rivers
- ♦ spawn in groups
- males will guard the nest until the eggs have hatched
- favor slow to moderate flow in clear streams
- one female can lay over 22,000 eggs
- ♦ take 2-3 years to mature
