

Northern Puffer

Sphoeroides maculatus



Description:

- dark olive to gray above with tiny dark spots on back, sides and cheeks
- ♦ yellowish white belly
- dark vertical bands on sides
- black bar between eyes
- squared caudal fin
- ♦ beak like mouth
- small spines/prickles cover the body
- small dorsal fin set back just before caudal fin

Size:

• up to 14 inches; more commonly 8-10 inches

Range:

♦ Newfoundland to northeast Florida

Facts:

- prefer bays, estuaries and protected coastal waters
- most puffers are poisonous, but these are not
- sold at fish markets in the north as "sea squab"
- feed on small crustaceans and other invertebrates
- ♦ bottom dwellers
- inflate by swallowing water or air as defense mechanism
- spawn May through August
- females release sticky eggs over sand or mud bottoms
- males fertilize and guard eggs
