

Spotfin Shiner

Cyprinella spiloptera



Description:

- dusky olive above
- black stripe along back
- sometimes a dusky bar on sides behind head
- breeding male has blue back, yellow to white fins and dusky dorsal fins
- black blotch on rear half of dorsal fin
- 8 anal rays

Size:

up to 5 inches, typically 2-4 inches

Range:

 Atlantic slope from St. Lawrence drainage, Quebec to Potomac River drainage, Virginia; Great Lakes (except Lake Superior), Hudson Bay and Mississippi River basins from Ontario and New York to southeastern North Dakota and south to Alabama and eastern Oklahoma


Facts:

- likes sand or gravel runs, and pools of creeks and rivers
- males establish territories and will fight others
- spawns in horizontal crevices in rocks and logs
- adults feed on surface insects
- more tolerant of turbidity, siltation, and pollution than other shiners
