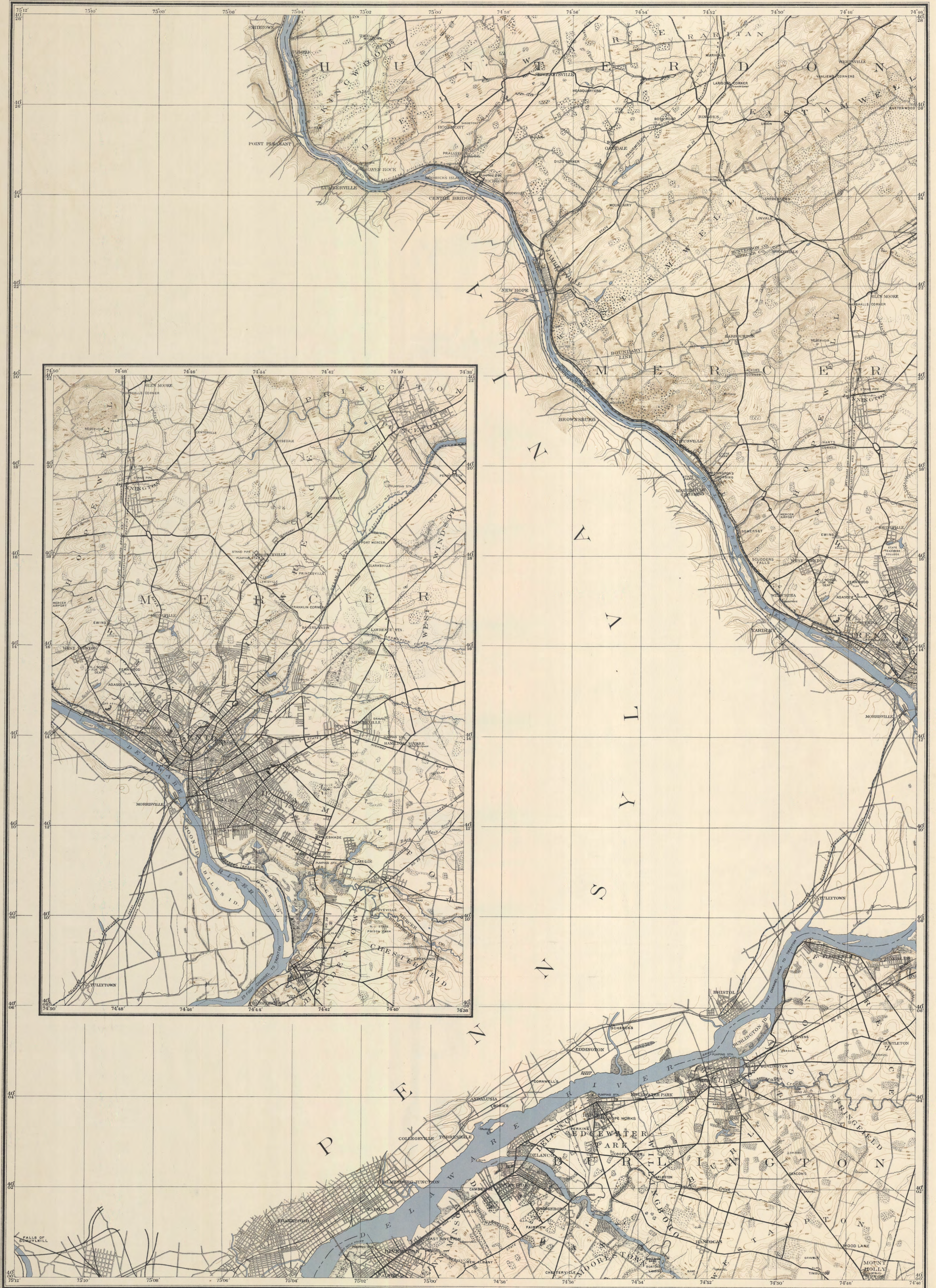

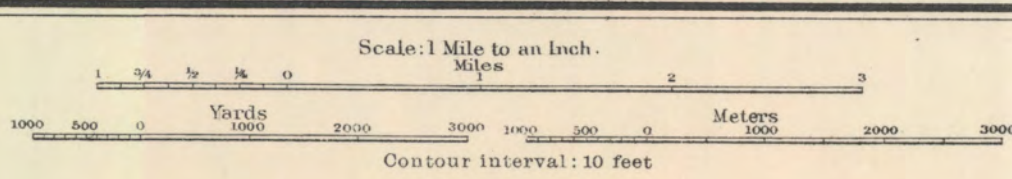

NOTE.—The curved lines are level lines drawn on the earth's surface. All points through which any given line passes are at the same level and their height above sea level is shown by the figure on the line. The line or fall from any line to the next is, as the figure will show, 10 feet. Figures not on any line show the actual elevation of the surface at a point indicated by a small cross.
