1 MS. PFAFF: This public hearing is slated
2 to begin at 6:00 p.m. It is 6:03 so we will start. Prior
3 to us starting the hearing, I would ask folks to please
4 silence you cellphones and electronic devices and then we
5 will begin.

6 Good evening. My name is Ann Pfaff. I am
7 the Supervisor of the Nuclear Preparedness Section in the
8 Bureau of Nuclear Engineering within the New Jersey
9 Department of Environmental Protection. I will be the
10 Hearing Officer this evening. The purpose of this hearing
11 is to receive comments and questions regarding the
12 adequacy and effectiveness of the New Jersey Radiological
13 Emergency Response Plan for Nuclear Power Plants. In
14 order that this hearing may be properly documented, these
15 proceedings are being recorded by a certified shorthand
16 reporter.

17 Everyone attending this meeting is asked to
18 sign the attendance sheet before leaving. The attendance
19 sheets for these hearings are used to update the Bureau of
20 Nuclear Engineering's public hearing mailing list.

21 Public notice of this hearing was published
22 in the New Jersey Register on June 4th, June 18th and July
23 2nd, 2018. In addition, public notice was published in
24 the South Jersey Times 2018 from July 2nd through July
25 11th, 2018. Copies of the public notice for the hearings

1 were mailed to all the people who attended last year's
2 hearings.

3 This hearing will proceed as follows: I
4 will provide a brief background on why we are conducting
5 this hearing. Then I will introduce the panel members and
6 ask them to briefly describe the role of their
7 organization in nuclear emergency preparedness and
8 response. Finally, I will open the hearing for comments
9 and questions from the public.

10 The New Jersey Radiation Accident Response
11 Act requires that the Department of Environmental
12 Protection, in cooperation with the New Jersey Division of
13 State Police, conduct public hearings to take comment on,
14 and to address questions relevant to the adequacy and
15 effectiveness of the New Jersey Radiological Emergency
16 Response Plan for Nuclear Power Plants.

17 These public hearings are held annually in
18 each of the three counties affected by the plan; Ocean
19 County for the Oyster Creek Nuclear Generation Station,
20 and Salem and Cumberland Counties for the Salem Unit 1,
21 Salem Unit 2, and Hope Creek Nuclear Generating Stations.
22 We are here tonight to listen to your questions and
23 comments on New Jersey's nuclear emergency response plan.
24 Comments on more general nuclear power issues or issues
25 that relate to licensing and regulatory matters at nuclear

1 power plants are not within the purview of this meeting
2 and hence are not appropriate, and will not be addressed.

3 The purpose of the plan is to coordinate
4 and implement an immediate and comprehensive response at
5 the state, county, and municipal levels to a radiological
6 emergency associated with any nuclear power plant
7 affecting the State of New Jersey. Copies of the plan are
8 available for public inspection at the Salem County
9 Emergency Management Office in Mannington Township, the
10 Cumberland County Office of Emergency Management in
11 Berkeley Township, and the New Jersey Office of Emergency
12 Management in West Trenton.

13 Now I would like to introduce the members
14 of our panel. This evening representing the Division of
15 State Police, Assistant Unit Head of the Radiological
16 Emergency Response Planning and Technical Unit was
17 supposed to be Mr. Gian Campesi. He is stuck in traffic
18 at this point. So hopefully he will join us but in his
19 absence I will contribute the part that he would share
20 with the public for the description of his agency's
21 contributions and then if there are any questions or
22 comments that pertain to the New Jersey Division of State
23 Police we will take those on record and they can reply
24 back by mail or by phone.

25 Also representing the New Jersey Department

1 of Enviromental Protection is Mr. Patrick Mulligan. Mr.
2 Mulligan is the Manager of DEP's Bureau of Nuclear
3 Engineering.

4 First I would ask Mr. Campesi to share the
5 State Police's role. So on his behalf I will read his
6 statement.

7 Good evening, I am Gian Campesi and I am
8 representing the State Office of Emergency Management
9 within the Division of State Police. Our Office has the
10 responsibility for administering and implementing the
11 Radiological Emergency Response Plan for incidents at
12 nuclear power plants in New Jersey. In addition to the
13 preparation of the radiological emergency plans, the New
14 Jersey State Police is the lead agency in the following
15 functional areas: notification and communication, command
16 and coordination, protective actions, which include
17 evacuation, shelter-in-place, monitor and prepare, access
18 control, food, water, and milk control. Parallel actions
19 also include traffic control, decontamination, exposure
20 control, mass care, law enforcement, fire control, public
21 health, and re-entry, return and recovery.

22 And now as hearing officer, I will ask Mr.
23 Mulligan to briefly describe the role of the Department of
24 Environmental Protection in the plan.

25 MR. MULLIGAN: Thank you, Ann. Good

1 evening. My name is Patrick Mulligan. I am the Manager
2 of the Bureau of Nuclear Engineering. I will briefly
3 discuss the role of the Department of Environmental
4 Protection in New Jersey's Radiological Emergency Response
5 Plan.

6 The New Jersey Radiological Emergency
7 Response Plan identifies all responsible state agencies
8 and outlines their specific roles in the event of a
9 nuclear emergency. The Plan includes Standard Operating
10 Procedures which contain detailed instructions and
11 guidelines used by each agency when performing their
12 specific duties. The Standard Operating Procedures are
13 reviewed and tested annually through drills and exercises.
14 The procedures are then revised as necessary in order to
15 enhance emergency response.

16 Under the New Jersey Radiation Accident
17 Response Act, the Department of Environmental Protection
18 has the lead role in Accident Assessment and control of
19 food, water and milk following an incident. Accident
20 Assessment involves two separate analyses, an engineering
21 analysis of the event at the plant as it unfolds, and an
22 analysis of the amount of radiation to which the public
23 may be exposed in the event of a release.

24 Depending upon the severity of the event,
25 the Department provides Protective Action Recommendations

1 to the Governor, who will make a final decision on actions
2 to be implemented to protect public health and safety.
3 Protective Action Recommendations for the public may
4 include administration of potassium iodide, evacuation,
5 sheltering, and access control within the affected, or
6 potentially affected, area.

7 The act also specifies that the Department
8 develop and implement a comprehensive monitoring strategy
9 that includes the daily monitoring of levels of
10 radioactivity in the environment. The Department provides
11 public health, safety, and technical guidance with respect
12 to the preparation and implementation of the Plan. The
13 Department's final responsibility under the Act is to
14 conduct, in corporation with State Police, public hearings
15 annually in each designated county to determine the
16 adequacy and effectiveness of the Plan.

17 Members of my staff that are here tonight
18 from the Department of Environmental Protection are
19 Mr. Elliott Rosenfeld from our nuclear engineering
20 section, Mr. Jay Vouglitois from our environmental
21 engineering section, and Ms. Sahar Azmat from our nuclear
22 emergency preparedness section. Thank you.

23 MS. PFAFF: We will now proceed with the
24 public's questions and comments. Those individuals who
25 wish to speak should complete a speaker registration card

1 and hand it to one of the staff. I will call the
2 speakers' names in the same order as I receive the
3 registration cards. Please be certain to clearly print
4 your name and address on the registration card so that we
5 may contact you if we need to respond to your comments and
6 questions more fully in writing. When I call your name,
7 come forward to the microphone, face the panel, and make
8 yourself comfortable.

9 Before you begin your comments, please
10 state and spell your name for the reporter. Speakers will
11 be limited to five minutes each. If time remains after
12 everyone has had a chance to speak, I will invite
13 additional comments from those who have already spoken.
14 In fairness to the speaker and in order that we all can
15 make the best use of this time, I ask the cooperation of
16 the audience in refraining from calling out. Comments
17 from the audience will only delay the proceedings and will
18 disrupt our ability to hear and accurately record the
19 speaker's statements.

20 Again, I would like to emphasize that we
21 are here tonight to listen to your questions and comments
22 on New Jersey's nuclear emergency response plan. Comments
23 on more general nuclear power issues or issues that relate
24 to licensing and regulatory matters at nuclear power
25 plants are not within the purview of this meeting and

1 hence are not appropriate, and will not be addressed.

2 As you see Mr. Campesi has joined us. To
3 fill you in, Gian, on your behalf I read the statement
4 that you would have read.

5 MR. CAMPESI: Thank you. I appreciate it.

6 MS. PFAFF: And on your behalf I let the
7 audience know that if there were comments that were
8 pertaining to the State Police that we would forward them
9 to you and you could answer them otherwise, but you are
10 here now and you are ready to take any comments or
11 questions that the public would like to share.

12 I do not have any commenter cards. So if
13 there is anyone here who would like to speak, please fill
14 out a card and let me know and I will call you forward. I
15 will acknowledge that we do not see any members of the
16 public here, most are familiar faces.

17 If there is no one that wishes to speak at
18 this point what we will do is temporarily adjourn the
19 meeting until 6:30 p.m. in fairness to anyone who might
20 have been delayed and has not arrived yet. So we will
21 hold our time off until 6:30 p.m. and at that time if
22 there are members of the public that wish to speak, we
23 will give them the opportunity and if there are no members
24 of the public that wish to speak we will adjourn the
25 meeting permanently. At this point we will take a

1 temporary adjournment until 6:30 p.m. thank you.

2 (adjournment took place at 6:14.)

3 MS. PFAFF: All right so the meeting was
4 supposed to be temporarily adjourned until 6:30. It is
5 now 6:30. I do not see any additional members of the
6 public. Is there anyone who would like to speak and
7 provide comment question for New Jersey's Nuclear
8 Emergency Response Plans for nuclear power plants? In the
9 absence of anyone wanting to make comment, we will
10 officially adjourn the meeting for Salem County. Thank
11 you.
