Good evening. My name is Ann Pfaff.

I am the Supervisor of the Nuclear Emergency

Preparedness Section in the Bureau of Nuclear

Engineering within the New Jersey Department of

Environmental Protection.

I will be the Hearing Officer this evening. The purpose of this hearing is to receive comments and questions regarding the adequacy and effectiveness of the New Jersey Radiological Emergency Response Plan for Nuclear Power Plants.

In order that this hearing may be properly documented, these proceedings are being recorded by a certified shorthand reporter.

Everyone attending this meeting is asked to sign the attendance sheet before leaving. The attendance sheets for these hearings are used to update the Bureau of Nuclear Engineering's public hearing mailing list.

Public notice of this hearing was published in the New Jersey Register on June 17th

and July 1st, 2019. In addition, public notice was published in the South Jersey Times from July 1st through July 9th, 2019. Copies of the public notice for the hearings were mailed to all the people who attended last year's hearings.

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This hearing will proceed as follows: I will provide a brief background as to why we are conducting this hearing. Then I will introduce the panel members and ask them to briefly describe the role of their organization in nuclear emergency preparedness and response. Finally, I will open the hearing for comments and questions from the public.

The New Jersey Radiation Accident
Response Act requires that the Department of
Environmental Protection in cooperation with the
New Jersey Division of State Police, conduct
public hearings to take comments on, and to
address questions relevant to the adequacy and
effectiveness of the New Jersey Radiological
Emergency Response Plan for Nuclear Power Plants.

These public hearings are held annually in each of the three counties affected by the plan; Ocean County for the Oyster Creek
Nuclear Generating Station, and Salem and

Cumberland Counties for the Salem Unit 1, Salem 1 2 Unit 2 and Hope Creek Nuclear Generating Stations. 3 We are here tonight to listen to your questions 4 and comments on New Jersey's nuclear emergency 5 response plan. Comments on more general nuclear 6 power issues or issues that relate to licensing 7 and regulatory matters at nuclear power plants are 8 not within the purview of this meeting, and hence 9 are not appropriate and will not be addressed. 10 Now, I would like to introduce the 11 members of the panel. To my right is Gian Campesi 12 representing the New Jersey Division of State 13 Police. Mr. Campesi is the Assistant Unit Head of 14 the Radiological Emergency Response Planning and 15 Technical Unit in the Office of Emergency 16 Management. To my left is Patrick Mulligan. 17 Patrick Mulligan is representing the New Jersey 18 Department of Environmental Protection. 19 Mulligan is the Assistant Director of the 20 Radiation Protection Program within the New Jersey 21 Department of Environmental Protection. 22 Now, I will ask Mr. Campesi to 23 briefly describe the role of the State Police in

MR. CAMPESI: Thank you. Good

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the plan.

evening. I am Gian Campesi representing the State 1 2 Office of Emergency Management within the Division of the State Police. Our office has the 3 4 responsibility for administering and implementing 5 the Radiological Emergency Response Plan for 6 incidents at nuclear power plants in New Jersey. 7 In addition to the preparation of 8 the radiological emergency plans, the New Jersey 9 State Police is the lead agency in the following 10 functional areas; notification and Communication, 11 Command and Coordination, Protective Actions, which include, Evacuation, Shelter-in-Place, 12 13 Monitor and Prepare, Access Control and Food, Water and Milk Control. 14 15 Parallel Actions also include 16 Traffic Control, Decontamination, Exposure 17 Control, Mass Care, Law Enforcement, Fire Control, 18 Public Health and Re-entry, Return and Recovery. 19 For the record, I would like to 20 introduce Captain Patrick Gorman of the New Jersey 21 State Police. He is the Emergency Preparedness 22 Bureau Chief and he is also part of the 23 Radiological Response Plan. Thank you. 2.4 Now, I will ask Mr. MS. PFAFF: 25 Mulligan to briefly describe the role of the

Department of the Environmental Protection in the plan.

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MR. MULLIGAN: Good evening. My name is Patrick Mulligan. I am the Assistant Director of the Radiation Protection Program. I will briefly discuss the role of the Department of Environmental Protection in New Jersey's Radiological Emergency Response Plan.

The New Jersey Radiological Response Plan identifies all responsible state agencies and outlines their specific roles in the event of a nuclear emergency. The Plan includes Standard Operating Procedures which contain detailed instructions and guidelines used by each agency when performing their specific duties. The Standard Operating Procedures are reviewed and tested annually through drills and exercises. The procedures are then revised as necessary in order to enhance emergency response.

Under the New Jersey Radiation

Accident Response Act, the Department of

Environmental Protection has the lead role in

Accident Assessment and control of food, water and milk following an incident. Accident Assessment involves two separate analyses, an engineering

analysis of the event at the plant as it unfolds, and an analysis of the amount of radiation to which the public may be exposed in the event of a release.

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Depending upon the severity of the event, the Department provides Protective Action Recommendations to the Governor who will make a final decision on actions to be implemented to protect public health and safety. Protective Action Recommendation for the public may include the administration of potassium iodide, evacuation, sheltering and access control within the affected, or potentially affected area.

The Act also specifies that the

Department develop and implement a comprehensive

monitoring strategy that includes the daily

monitoring of levels of radioactivity in the

environment. The Department provides public

health, safety, and technical guidance with

respect to the preparation and implementation of

the plan. The Department's final responsibility

under the Act is to conduct, in cooperation with

the State Police, public hearings annually in each

designated county to determine the adequacy and

effectiveness of the Plan. I would like to take a

moment to identify the staff I have here from the Department of Environmental Protection: Elliot Rosenfeld representing our engineering section.

Jay Vouglitois representing our environmental section and three folks from our Nuclear Emergency Preparedness section; Sahar Azmat, Daniel Salama, and Rubin Papraniku.

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We will now proceed with MS. PFAFF: the public's questions and comments.
