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Burlington County Institute of Technology Students Recognized by State Board of Education

The State Board of Education today recognized 12 students from Burlington County Institute of Technology for their participation in the school's Family, Career and Community Leaders of America chapter.

The Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) chapter at Burlington County Institute of Technology (BCIT) is part of a national vocational student organization for high school students studying family and consumer sciences education.
