

Identifying the IEP Team Members

"Each team member brings important information to the IEP meeting. Members share their information and work together to write the child's Individualized Education Program. Each person's information adds to the team's understanding of the child and what services the child needs" (USED, 2019).

Child Study Team Preparation

- Be aware and follow established timelines
- Conduct a record review
- Observe the student, if appropriate
- Gather Information on these various IEP <u>components</u>
- Connect with parents and families prior to the meeting and inquire about individual and cultural needs to participate effectively
- Consult with educators and providers on the individual student's needs
- Establish an agenda
- Prepare any necessary documentation
- Establish strategies for <u>effective</u> LION communication during a meeting

Teacher Tips and Strategies

The IEP creates an opportunity for teachers, parents, school administrators, related services personnel, and students (when appropriate) to work together to improve educational results for children with disabilities. The IEP is the cornerstone of a quality education for each child with a disability (USED, 2019). This can be accomplished by:

- Developing and writing effective IEPs (IEP Tip Sheet Series)
- Gather important information on the student
- Communicate with families to develop positive relationships
