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Accreditation Status

INSTITUTIONAL ACCREDITATION

Since 1973, Gloucester County College has been accredited by the Commission on Higher Education – Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools. Accreditation was subsequently reaffirmed in 1977, 1987, and 1998. The college is currently engaged in the self-study component for the 2008 re-accreditation requirements. Findings of the self-study and subsequent visits by the Middle States Commission of Higher Education will take place through spring of 2008.

The College is a member of the New Jersey Association of Colleges and Universities and the American Association of Community Colleges.

PROFESSIONAL ACCREDITATION

The Nursing program is accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC). The Respiratory Therapy Program is accredited by the Committee on Accreditation for Respiratory Care. The Diagnostic Medical Sonography (DMS) Program is accredited by the Joint Review Committee on Education in Diagnostic Medical Sonography (JRC-DMS). The Nuclear Medicine Technology (NMT) Program is accredited by the Joint Review Committee on Educational Programs in Nuclear Medicine Technology (JRC-NMT) and the New Jersey Environmental Protection Agency Bureau of Radiologic Health. In addition, the DMS and NMT Programs are accredited through the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Educational Programs (CAAHEP).

As a result of Gloucester County College's initial application to the American Bar Association for accreditation of the college's Paralegal A.A.S. program, an on-site evaluation was conducted by the A.B.A. in the spring of 1998. Based on that review, the college received full accreditation with no reservations from the A.B.A. for this program. After an on-site visit in October 2006, the Paralegal Program was re-approved by the ABA in February 2007. That approval will be in effect until August 2012. The Paralegal Program's Certificate is a part of that re-approval.









Fall 2006 Enrollment by Gender



Enrollment by Gender, Fall 2002-2006





Major Research and Public Service Activities

COLLEGE ACTIVITIES

Gloucester County College continues to serve as a hub for numerous county-wide public service activities, including but not limited to:

- Facilitated the development of Department of Labor Customized Training Grants totaling close to \$1.7 million in awards in fiscal 2006 and \$887,000 in fiscal 2007. This funding is used by local area companies to provide training to their employees to improve/upgrade their skills.
- Awarded \$2.4 in grants including a \$2 million Community Based Job Training Grant to increase the capacity of GCC to offer education and training in food science.
- Provided a wide variety of cultural activities, such as art exhibits, concerts, theatre
 productions, and hands-on workshops, through the Fine Arts Center and the Art
 Gallery.
- Hosted the Women in Technology Fair in which over 180 middle school girls from 24 schools throughout Gloucester County attended a full-day series of workshops designed to illustrate the rewards and satisfactions of careers in various technology fields.
- Served as a major provider of short-term occupational training for the Gloucester County College Workforce Investment Board.
- Acted as a lead agency in the Gloucester County Adult Basic Skills Consortium which is funded through the New Jersey Department of Education.
- Served as the primary training resource for the Delaware Valley Safety Council, annually providing specialized safety training to over 7,000 chemical industry workers.
- Hosted the National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) Youth Summer Camp.
- Provided high-quality summer camp experiences to 925 students from the region.
- Acted as a contact point for adults seeking information and assistance about returning to college through programs in the Center for Adult Services and the Center for People in Transition.
- Qualified for a \$180,000 continuation grant for an innovative Youth Transitions To
 Work Program involving organized labor, construction contractors, area high schools
 and students who will enter the college this fall, as the first step to becoming
 construction journey-workers.
- Administered the Retired Senior Volunteer Services Program which provides over 100,000 hours of annual volunteer service, directed to community need.
