D. Student outcomes:

Several measures of student outcomes are presented in this section. They are: Two year graduation rate, three-year combined graduation and transfer rates by race/ethnicity; and third-semester retention rates by attendance status.

What is the graduation rate for Ocean County College students?

There are several ways of defining graduation or completion rates. Students attend college for many reasons, not all of which point toward the goal of graduation. While many students begin their attendance at OCC with the intention of graduating, others begin their studies for the following reasons: (1) to take a few courses for promotion possibilities at their place of employment; (2) to enhance their knowledge in specific areas; (3) to experience personal enrichment; and (4) to take a number of courses and then transfer to another college prior to graduation.

In recent years, the federal government has established a definition of the graduation rate for postsecondary institutions. The definition is included in the Student Right-to-Know Act and its enabling regulations. The graduation rate of students attending postsecondary institutions is the number of first-time students in a given fall semester who complete their degree within 150% of the normal time for completion. Since OCC is a two-year institution, those students entering in the fall would have three years to complete their associate degree requirements. Students may be eliminated from the tracking requirement if they enter the armed forces, go on an official church mission (e.g., Peace Corps), or if they die or are unable to continue enrollment due to a permanent disability.

What is the "success" rate for Ocean County students?

Community college students may be judged successful in their collegiate career by measures other than just graduation. New Jersey community colleges have established another measure known as "success" rate. It is computed as the percentage of an entering first-time, full-time, degree-seeking freshman fall class who achieved one of the following:

- (1) Graduated
- (2) Transferred to a NJ senior public institution before graduation
- (3) Were still enrolled and did not graduate within four years; or
- (4) Left in good academic standing (GPA of 2.00 or higher).

In theory, OCC should add the percent of students who transferred to a NJ private institution or to an out-of-state institution; however, the data cannot be collected reliably. Another problem is the accuracy of the GPA data. In many cases, the GPA data is not up to date and, in other cases, the data is missing since the State Commission on Higher Education is just beginning to collect the spring semester data. As a result, this definition of "success" may be considered a minimum.

The Ocean County College faculty may be grouped into two categories, full-time and part-time. Full-time ten month teaching faculty members are required by contract to teach 15 semester credit hours for each semester, or a maximum of 30 semester credit hours per academic year of two semesters. Full-time twelve month lecturers are required to teach 21 credit hours in each semester and 6 credit hours in the summer for a total of 48 credit hours. Non-teaching full-time faculty members include counselors and librarians who have different contractual requirements. Part-time (adjunct) faculty, where possible, are issued contracts in August for the ensuing academic year. Employment under an adjunct faculty contract to teach an assigned course(s) is contingent upon a sufficient number of students registering for said course(s).

The number of full-time teaching faculty has increased from 110 in fall 2000 to 113 in fall 2009. The number of adjunct faculty increased over the same period from 263 to 412. Full-time female faculty comprised 61.1 percent of the total full-time faculty in fall 2009, as compared with 50.9 percent in fall 2000.

The racial/ethnic backgrounds of full-time faculty are primarily Caucasian (92.0 percent), nearly identical to the proportion in the total Ocean County population. Two full-time faculty members are Black (1.8 percent). Three full-time faculty members have a Hispanic ethnic background, (2.7 percent); as compared with a county population that is 7.3 percent Hispanic and a student body that is 7.2 percent Hispanic. Two faculty members are Asian, 1.7 percent of the total full-time faculty. Two faculty members have an American Indian ethnic background.

The proportion of tenured teaching faculty has averaged approximately 80.2% for the last ten years and currently stands at 69.9%.

G. Profile of Ocean County College: Degrees and certificate programs

The college has been authorized to offer three degrees: the associate in arts (A.A.), the associate in science (A.S.), and the associate in applied science (A.A.S.). Currently available with the A.A. designation are the liberal arts programs (including Honors Program) and Digital Mass Media with two options. Currently available with the A.S. designation are the following academic emphases: business administration, computer science, criminal justice, environmental science, general studies, and public service. Currently available with the A.A.S. designation are the following programs: administrative office management, allied health, business, computer science/information technology, fire science, interpreter training, nursing, technical studies, and visual communications technology. In addition, the college offers twelve Certificate of Proficiency programs. They are in administrative office management, criminal justice, exercise science, fire science, information technology, paralegal studies, personal training, physical therapy aide, small business management, sports management, teaching assistant/child care, and visual communications. H. Major research and public service activities

OCC is not required to submit to the National Science Foundation their R&D Expenditures form #411 as we do not receive any federal, state or local funding to specifically support R&D activities, nor are any institutional funds budgeted or expensed for this purpose.

In the various Ocean County College academic schools, faculty members have displayed their scholarship and creativity in local, regional, national, and even international venues. These successes serve to prominently highlight the reputation of Ocean County College as a center of excellence in education, scholarship, and creative work.

School of Language and the Arts

In the School of Language and the Arts, several of our faculty members have published impressive scholarly and creative work. In July 2010, Dr. Ali Botein-Furrevig published her book, *Heart of the Stranger: A Portrait of Lakewood's Orthodox Community*. The book is a combination of scholarship, interviews, commentary, and personal experience during the two year research process. Ali also continues to serve as Scholar Honoraria at the Manchester Library's *Shalom Book and Film Club* and speaks throughout Ocean and Monmouth Counties on Yiddish culture. Dr. Botein-Furrevig spearheaded the college's Holocaust Remembrance Week program which included arranging guest lecturers, holocaust survivors, student readings, films, a religious memorial service and a student play on genocide.

In April 2010, Dr. Katja Hawlitschka of the English Department presented a paper on quality television at the NEMLA (Northeast Modern Language Association) conference and had a paper accepted for the PAMLA (Pacific Ancient and Modern Language Association) conference on the representation of Islam in contemporary popular literature in the West.

Dr. Sandra Brown served as a Contributing Editor for *TYCA Nor'easter: Newsletter of TYCA Northeast*, Fall 2009, Vol. 12, #1.

Heidi Sheridan helped students to create, organize, design, and print the Literary Magazine, *Seascape* and presented a paper at the national conference of The Association of Writers and Writing Programs on how to teach creative writing students to incorporate stage directions into their plays.

Professor Lynn Kramer Siracusa actively served on both the Native American History Month Committee and the Poetry Festival Committee. She is currently working as a member of the Retention Alert Team to retain at-risk students.

Jennifer Dellner presented for the International Conference, "2000 years of Solitude: Exile after Ovid," 3 September 2009 in Durham, UK. In October, she presented "At Play in the Fields of Academia: Bachelard, Iser, and Interdisciplinarity" for the Association for Integrative Studies Conference, Tuscaloosa.

Jayanti Tamm completed *God Lived in Queens*, a work of creative nonfiction that will be published in *Forgotten Borough*, a new book by SUNY Press in February 2011. On September



2009, Jayanti was invited to speak on the art of the memoir for the Book Festival at both George Mason University and Northern Virginia Community College. She spoke on American cults at the International Cultic Studies Association's conference in Denver, CO, March 2010.

The Dean of the School, Dr. Maysa Hayward, visited Cairo University in July 2010 in order to begin the process of drafting an articulation agreement between OCC and Cairo University.

Dr. David Bordelon set up a project titled "Random Acts of Poetry" as part of the college's celebration of National Poetry Month (April), for the purpose of reading poetry on campus.

During June, July and August 2010 music faculty member Karin Gargone directed the Ocean Grove Auditorium choral/orchestral performance of Giocomo Rossini's sacred masterwork *Stabat Mater*. She also served as the piano accompanist for the Monmouth Civic Chorus's "Summer Choral Workshop" on August 4th, which featured J.S. Bach's monumental *B-Minor Mass*. Professor Gargone will accompany guitarist Keith Calmes in his performance of the Guitar Concerto by Brazilian composer Heitor Villa-Lobos.

Advisor Gary Shaffer worked intensively to improve the college newspaper, *The Viking News*, by introducing a new format and design. New outreach efforts boosted readership and led to increased student involvement.

School of Social Science and Human Services

In the School of Social Science and Human Services, faculty members provided extra-curricular support to students by assisting with history outings and trips to the United States Institute of Peace in Washington, D.C.

Through the efforts of Professor Bradford Young, three political clubs have been formed or reactivated. As a result, the OCC Republicans, the OCC Democrats and Independents, and Students Learning about Politics have experienced a resurgence in membership. Professor Young also provided OCC with insights into political issues by sponsoring and moderating a debate on medical marijuana and by coordinating a question and answer session with Lt. Gubernatorial candidate Frank Esposito. Professor Young was also the voice of OCC as a political specialist when he participated on local radio station, 92.7 WOBM's election night broadcast. In addition, Professor Young directed the New Jersey College Republican State Convention at the college and assisted in Congressman John Adler's visit to OCC.

Phi Beta Lambda (PBL), the business club, competed at the state competition in the spring of 2010 and won over 20 awards while PBL's advisor, Professor Kathy Dillon, was named advisor of the year. The Gold Seal of Merit for which two and four-year colleges and universities compete was awarded to OCC for both its community involvement and its high membership. Members of the business faculty engaged in community fundraising events which resulted in the donation of over \$5,000.00 and many hours of volunteer service to organizations such as the Children's Specialized Hospital, Oceans of Love, the Veteran's Administration, the YMCA, the Barnegat Bay Estuary, and 21-Plus Challenged Adults.



Members of the nursing discipline have mentored several graduate students who are working towards their Masters degrees in nursing education (MSN). OCC nursing professors attended educational programs in topics which included High Fidelity Simulation, Dermatologic Conditions, Aging, Cancer, and Mental Health Nursing.

Many of the teaching staff sought professional development through their memberships in professional organizations and by attending the NJEA Conference in Atlantic City. Additionally, Professor Lynn Kenneally attended the Garden State Paralegal Conference and, as the Honors Coordinator, attended the National Collegiate Honors Conference in Washington, D.C. As a Guest of NASA, Professor Kenneally presented to science educators at the Faculty Institute at NASA's Earth and Space Science Education (FINESSE) Conference in Baltimore, MD. Furthermore, Prof. Kenneally was chosen as a guest of the National Endowment for the Humanities and attended a week-long *We the People* Seminar in Brooklyn, NY.

From the anthropology discipline, Professor Christine Kitchin attended the annual meeting of the Society for Anthropology in Community Colleges entitled, "Sustainable Teaching in the 21st Century," in San Francisco, CA. She also led sixteen anthropology students and community members on a travel seminar to the American Southwest to experience Indian Reservations and archaeological sites.

In the education discipline, Dr. Alfred Longo has continued in the capacity of a scorer for the School Leaders Licensure Exam for the Educational Testing Service (ETS).

A representative of the psychology discipline, Dr. Kathy McCormick has worked towards creating educational opportunities for our students as Scholarship Chair of Soroptimist International of the Toms River Area. In addition, she is a peer reviewer for *Psychology of Women Quarterly (APA Publication)* and a master reviewer for *Quality Matters (QM)*.

A member of our business discipline, Dr. Virginia Reilly, is also a QM Master Reviewer who served on the National Training Initiative. This program looks to qualify instructors to teach online and provides them with opportunities to improve their online course designs. Dr. Reilly serves as Chair of QM for New Jersey and conducts national online course reviews. She also participated in a stock market simulation about the American economic system and the global economy (the NJ Stock Market Challenge Workshop). As a result of her involvement in Project SCREEN (Senior Citizens and Retiree Empowerment Education Network), Dr. Reilly was selected as one of only 300 nationally to receive a scholarship designed to train non-profit counselors to deliver effective financial literacy to seniors.

Community service, in the form of a toy drive for the *Yoga and U Charity*, resulted in the provision of over 500 toys to students of the Hugh J. Boyd Elementary School in Toms River. This was accomplished through the efforts of Professor Maria Flynn, who also led the Sociology Club in their participation in the *Defeat ALS Walk* in Seaside Heights.

Dr. Alfred Atanda collected and shipped educational materials to Ghana and Nigeria to help sustain educational efforts in Africa.



Members provided service to the college through presentations during 2010 celebrations of Women's History Month, American Indian Heritage Read-In Day, Constitution Day, and Black History Month.

School of Mathematics, Science, and Technology

The School of Mathematics, Science and Technology sponsored a continuous food drive to supply canned goods to various local food banks.

Members of the Engineering department in cooperation with the Office of School Relations held the annual robotics and cardboard canoe race competition for the Vocational-Technical schools in the area. A new competition was started called "Wearable Electronics."

Members of the Science department joined forces with Georgian Court University in celebrating National Chemistry Week. Chemistry Club Advisor Prof. Maria Tamburro organized the event through the Toms River Branch of the Ocean County Library. Students from both schools volunteered their time and talents in stations that offered hands-on chemistry to visitors and community members. The target audience was K-12 public school students. This event was featured in the *American Chemical Society Journal of Chemical News and Engineering*.

The OCC Chemistry Club has been recognized as a Student Affiliate Chapter of the American Chemical Society, students and faculty were featured in a video challenge, "I Am a Proud Chemist". The film won a \$1,500 prize and was featured at the ACS's National Meeting.

Speaking on topics pertaining to distance learning, Dr. Jim Brown, Maria Tamburro and Christine Spencer presented at various conventions and seminars.



I. Major capital projects underway in fiscal year 2010

Arts and Community Center

In September 2007, OCC broke ground on an addition to the Fine Arts Center, re-named the Arts and Community Center (ACC), an addition that was completed and dedicated in 2008. This new 16,000 square foot academic wing houses art and pottery labs, classrooms, instructional studios, and offices. It also has provided space for the Offices of Continuing and Professional Education and the Academy for Lifelong Learning, relocated from rented space off campus. The new wing is connected to the original Fine Arts Center through a common hallway, stairwell and a new elevator. The original part of the Center includes a theater, theater lobby, art gallery, green room, classrooms, music wing, piano laboratory, and offices. Extensive renovations to this existing space were completed in the summer of 2010, and include an enlarged and improved theater and renovations to existing classroom and office space. A third section, a little theater/performance center, was also completed in the summer of 2010.

New Academic Building

In July 2008, ground was broken for construction of a new Academic Building, which stands on the campus mall, between the Administration Building and Library. Construction was completed in July 2009. This 32,000 square foot addition, named John C. Bartlett Hall, houses 3 computer labs, 14 classrooms, faculty offices, and faculty and student lounges. It is both LEEDS certified and wireless. In addition, Bartlett Hall features gardens, walks, patios, walled terraces, and landscaping that complements the natural beauty of the campus. A new 140-car parking lot is situated to the immediate east of the new building.

Gateway Building and College Center

The college has two extensive building projects that are currently waiting for alternative capital funding resources. Plans for both are considered to be "on hold" at this time, but near future development is anticipated. The first, known as the Gateway Building, is a new academic building of approximately 70,000 square feet that the college is building to house both Ocean and Kean at Ocean students. In addition, the college plans a two-phase renovation to the College Center which includes building a large new wing and, once that can be occupied, renovating the existing structure.

Renewal and Renovation

In addition to a major renovation of the college Planetarium to house a new high-powered telescope (completed in the summer of 2010) and the addition of our own co-gen plant (anticipated completion: 2011), the College has also evaluated all 19 campus buildings to identify areas that require improvement. Campus buildings were surveyed to evaluate the existing conditions of major components, such as foundations, roofing, plumbing, HVAC, electrical systems, fire protection, and stairways, as well as ADA and building code compliance. More than \$8 million dollars of improvement projects were discovered and prioritized and have been incorporated into the Facilities Master Plan.



Section III. Other Institutional Information: The Strategic Plan, 2010 - 2015

Planning Assumptions

- <u>Institutional growth will continue</u> to a maximum total of 20,000 students on the main campus (developed to 30% of its land mass) by 2025, 8,000 students at the Southern Educational Center by 2025, and a possible 4,000 at a third western extension site to be developed in 2020 for a total campus unduplicated enrollment of 32,000. Distance Learning enrollments will increase exponentially as we explore new markets and create new partnerships.
- The <u>major mission of the college</u> will continue to be to <u>serve the transfer needs of the students</u> using specialized career and jobs programs, work partnerships, certificate programs, and voc-tech alliances to serve the <u>career needs of the county</u>, as they present themselves.
- The major <u>academic partnerships</u> the college pursues will be to make transfer baccalaureate and masters programs available on the college's main campus or create alliances with schools that offer our graduates distinct academic advantages. We will continue to work to arrange articulation agreements that allow our students to transfer seamlessly to quality schools with financial assistance opportunities.
- The major values of the college will continue to be <u>academic quality</u>, <u>variety and excellence of teaching/learning</u>, and <u>seeking a national reputation</u> for the academic preparedness and success of our graduates.
- The educational delivery modes will continue to <u>blend traditional classroom education</u> with cutting edge technology in distance learning modes.
- The college will continue to <u>partner with the county and with business</u> <u>enterprises to</u> develop resources that benefit the students and the citizens of Ocean County.
- We will continue to affirm a <u>culture of assessment</u> leading to improved accountability, transparency, and overall institutional quality, utilizing data-based decision making practices whenever they are effective;
- Increasing globalization will require further <u>internationalization of the curriculum.</u>
- Social and cultural change in the larger society will continue to place demands on the college for <u>organizational flexibility</u>.
- We assume continuing fiscal support from the state and county, but we recognize the need to <u>expand the college's capital position</u> through effective and low-risk leveraging.




