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# Section One

## SYNOPSIS: UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING PROGRAM

## THE NEW JERSEY UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

### **DEFINITION:**

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System is based upon the compilation, classification, and analysis of crime data reported by all New Jersey police agencies in accordance with the regulations prescribed by law.

### DEVELOPMENT

The New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Law (N.J.S.A. 52:17 B-5.1 et. seq.) was enacted on May 16, 1966, and became effective January 1, 1967. Responsibility for the establishment, direction, control, and supervision of the Uniform Crime Reporting System was assigned to the State's Attorney General. The Attorney General authorized the New Jersey State Police to collect and collate the crime data received from law enforcement agencies within the state.

At the request of the Attorney General, the New Jersey State Police researched crime systems in operation throughout the nation in order to establish a firm foundation from which to grow. The most logical approach was the paralleling of the federal crime reporting system. There was a distinct need for a compatibility feature that would enhance both the state and federal systems through the data entry at both levels.

This compatibility has, as its nucleus, the standard classification of offenses established by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Regardless of the label placed on a particular offense in the various states' systems, *i.e.,* felony, misdemeanor, disorderly persons, if the incident meets the federal standard it will be reported as an offense.

The terms "crime" and "offense" are used interchangeably in this publication, and refer to an act committed in violation of a law which is reportable under the guidelines of the Uniform Crime Reporting Program.

The New Jersey State Chiefs of Police Association has served the program in an advisory capacity since 1966. The contributions of this association have proved valuable to the success of the program. This association works in close harmony with the State Police as a means of improving the quality of reporting through recommended program standards, policies and procedures.

### **COLLECTION OF CRIME DATA**

As required by statute, all law enforcement agencies in the state submit monthly and annual summary crime reports to the program. During the year 2015, offense and arrest data were received from 469 municipal police departments and the New Jersey State Police (acting as the reporting agent for the 77 municipalities without local police services). In addition to the 469 municipal police departments, there were 19 municipalities which contracted with other police departments for local police services and crime data reporting.

In addition to the above agencies, data was received from the state's 21 prosecutors, 21 sheriffs' departments, two (2) county police departments, and one (1) county park police department. In order to incorporate all New Jersey law enforcement agencies under the system, the nine (9) other state agencies with law enforcement responsibilities (excluding state police) and 14 college campus police departments were incorporated within the program. Collectively, a total of 538 law enforcement agencies submit reports to the New Jersey State Police.

### METHOD

A State of New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Guide has been distributed to all contributors. It outlines reporting procedures in detail, and is complete to the extent of providing examples and illustrations. Field representatives provide additional instruction and clarification when required.

All reported offenses are related to the municipality in which they occur rather than to the agency which may conduct the investigation. The clearance is credited to the municipality in which the offense occurred. Each contributing agency is responsible for compiling its own

reports. Law enforcement agencies report the number of known offenses according to the following categories: Homicide (Murder and Manslaughter), Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson. The "Crime in New Jersey," and the Federal Bureau of Investigation's "Crime in the United States" publications exclude manslaughters, simple assaults, and arsons from the "Index" offenses. These are further referred to as "violent" and "nonviolent" crimes as graphically illustrated in Section VII under "Municipal and County Offenses and Demographic Data," and Section II, "State Summary and Offense Analysis."

All reported offenses are compiled from a record of all criminal complaints received by police from victims or other sources, or discovered by the police during routine operations. Complaints determined to be unfounded are eliminated from this count. Analytical data pertaining to specific crime categories are also reported, *i.e.* total adult and juvenile arrests made during the month. Police killed or assaulted and arson data are also collected monthly. Police personnel information is submitted on an annual basis.

### **VERIFICATION PROCESSES**

The uniformity and accuracy of data gathered from contributors must be safeguarded through various ways. Although guidelines and instructions are provided to each contributor, they are not the panaceas for the accuracy being sought.

The reports received by the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit are recorded and examined for mathematical accuracy and reasonableness of the interpretation of the offense classifications. Improper classifications, changes in reporting procedures, or actual change are identified in this manner. Errors of a minor nature are corrected by direct telephone contact with the contributors, while all other errors are resolved through a personal visit by a field representative to the reporting agency.

Further verification is accomplished through the analysis of statistical data accrued from the reports submitted. Fluctuations in crime rates noted from previous submissions are verified by the field representatives through their municipal counterpart.

### FUNCTION

Police executives make use of this data in administrative, planning, and operational determinations for their respective jurisdictions. The State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit provides assistance to municipal police agencies through the individual analysis of statistics as they relate to specific crime problems within their jurisdiction. Police executives also use this data for identifying personnel and equipment needs. The Uniform Crime Reporting Program requirements not only have increased police efficiency in reporting and record keeping areas, but have helped police in their day to day operations.

Although the data collected on the offenses of manslaughter and simple assault are not presented in the annual report, they are required for the federal system. Data for these offenses is processed and provided for research purposes.

The New Jersey State Police UCR Units are placing a greater reliance on the individual reporting agencies for the accuracy of the data published.

## **PROFILE OF NEW JERSEY**

New Jersey is situated between the major industrial markets of New York and Philadelphia. The geographic location of the state has been a major factor in its growth and development. The many miles of interstate roadways within the state connect New Jersey directly with the neighboring states of New York, Pennsylvania, and Delaware. Additionally, New Jersey roadways accommodate large volumes of traffic as a corridor for commerce and travelers from throughout the United States.

The state is geographically composed of 21 counties which contain 565 incorporated municipalities. Nationally, New Jersey, although 46th in size, ranks tenth in population and first as the most densely populated state in the country. In addition to this density of 1,192.5 persons per square mile, New Jersey still has many miles of rural areas and sparsely settled communities. The areas of density are concentrated around the major urban centers and those venues most accessible for commuting.

## STATE, COUNTY AND MUNICIPAL PROFILES

The presentation of state, county and municipal profiles in this section is offered for the purpose of projecting, for the consideration of the reader, a group of recognizable factors which may affect the amount and type of crime that occurs from community to community. Selection of the areas of information to be related to individual municipalities was based on the immediacy and completeness of data available.

Population statistics presented here, and throughout this publication, were obtained from the Department of Labor, Division of Labor Market and Demographic Research.

Character of municipalities by urban, suburban and rural classifications, and square miles, were initially compiled by the Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes. Following is a list of categories used and a description of each category.

- URBAN CENTER Densely populated with extensive development.
- URBAN SUBURBAN Near an urban center but not as extremely developed and more residential areas.
- SUBURBAN Predominantly single family residential, within a short distance of an urban area.
- RURAL Scattered small communities and isolated single family dwellings.
- RURAL CENTER High density core area with surrounding rural municipalities.

Certain other socioeconomic factors present in varying degrees in all communities may have an influence on resulting crime rates. Obvious difficulties in the identification, documentation and measurement of these factors, however, precluded their application in this report.

Those factors presented were listed to affirm their existence within the county and community and to provide a base for consideration in the evaluation of that community's crime experience.

### **RESORT MUNICIPALITY CRIME RATES**

On July 10, 1998, section 4 of P.L. 1966, c37(C.52:17B-5.4) was amended to require the Uniform Crime Report to include, in addition to the regular statistics, an alternative calculation that takes into account the seasonal population of resort municipalities.

The Department of Labor has been mandated to determine which municipalities qualify as resort municipalities and certify their annual mean population (which includes seasonal population estimates.)

## **CRIME FACTORS**

In order to provide a meaningful statistical profile of crime within the State of New Jersey, each law enforcement agency must provide the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit with data that depicts specific crimes that are occurring within their jurisdiction. There is a need for compatibility with the National Uniform Crime Reporting System and, therefore, categories of offense classifications used within the state are identical with those of the National System. This results in equitable conclusions being drawn from the data submitted.

Reported Part 1 offenses and arrests are recorded in the municipality where they occurred, regardless of the outside investigative agency which may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case.

The factors which influence crime rates are dependent upon characteristics of the community. When attempting to interpret the crime statistics presented herein, one should be aware of the social structure and factors that lead to or cause criminal behavior.

Crime rates in this publication are based on the stable population of the municipality. Municipalities that experience high population increases due to special events or commuters or with high seasonal populations, may indicate a higher crime rate per one thousand than may be normal for a municipality their size. A separate section provides statistics for resort municipalities using crime rates which include seasonal populations.

Set forth below are some factors which, by type and volume, will affect the crime rate that occurs from place to place:

- Density and size of the community population and the metropolitan areas of which it is a part.
- Composition of the population with reference particularly to age, sex and race.
- Economic status, including job availability, and mores of the population.
- Relative stability of population, including commuter, seasonal, and other transient types.
- Climate, including seasonal weather conditions.
- Cultural conditions, such as educational, recreational, and religious characteristics.
- Effective strength of law enforcement agencies.
- Administrative and investigative emphases of law enforcement.
- Policies of other components of the criminal justice system (*i.e.*, prosecutorial, judicial, correctional, and probational).
- Crime reporting practices of the general citizenry.
- Attitudes of the public toward crime reporting.
- The administrative and investigative efficiency of the local law enforcement agency, including the degree of adherence to crime reporting standards.
- Cooperation of adjoining and overlapping police agencies.

## THE POLICE POINT OF VIEW

The New Jersey State Police Uniform Crime Reporting Unit surveyed various police agencies of the state, attempting to ascertain their opinion concerning factors contributing to the increase or decrease of specific crimes in their municipality. One of the goals of the Uniform Crime Reporting Unit is to assist police in reducing crime by first identifying its extent, type and location. The following viewpoints are offered with the expectation of reaching this goal.

### RAPE

### Increases:

• The New Jersey State Police UCR Unit incorporated a revised Rape Definition effective January 1, 2015 into the State of New Jersey's Summary Reporting System. The FBI initiated the new definition on January 1, 2013, to provide a more inclusive definition leading to a more accurate understanding of the scope and volume of these crimes. The new definition is anticipated to initially increase the number of reported rape offenses. Rape is now defined as penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

The revised definition:

- Includes either Male or Female Victims or Offenders.
- Includes instances in which the victim is incapable of giving consent because of temporary or permanent mental or physical incapacity, (e.g., due to the influence of drugs or alcohol or because of age).
- Reflects the various forms of sexual penetration understood to be rape.

### ROBBERY

### Decreases:

- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State Criminal Code.
- Advanced technology in communications has led to increased exchanges of information between police departments.
- Highly visible foot patrols being deployed in commercial areas and densely populated residential areas.
- Use of Anti-crime Unit in high robbery areas.

### Increases:

- Resort areas have shown an increasing seasonal population.
- Our highly mobile society provides easy access to areas which were previously difficult to reach.

### BURGLARY

### Decreases:

- Better deployment of police personnel, such as highly visible foot patrols in high density crime areas, and increased patrols during probable time and at probable locations of burglaries.
- More stringent sentencing requirements under the State's Criminal Code have been a deterrent.
- Crime Prevention Programs are being stressed in many communities and citizens have been taking a more active part by reporting suspicious persons or circumstances.

### Increases:

- Extreme increases in population in certain areas have led to new housing in suburban and rural areas.
- All adult residents are working; frequently leaving homes unoccupied for long periods of time.
- Abandoned, foreclosed, and bank owned properties often targeted for copper pipe and other scrap items.

### LARCENY

### Decreases:

- Public awareness programs contribute to the decrease in thefts from parked vehicles.
- Improved or additional lighting deters criminal acts from occurring in parking areas.
- "Safe Streets" Programs and Anti-crime Units have been established in many communities.

### Increases:

- Shoplifting is a theft that police have little or no control over. Store security forces are under the control of the store administration, and their policies vary from strict enforcement, arrest and prosecution, to only a warning. Policy change has been directed toward prosecuting the offenders rather than warning them, causing to some extent an increase in the number of shoplifting offenses reported to the police.
- Certain types of property such as GPS devices, mobile phones, laptops, and other electronic devices are common and present resale opportunities.
- Youth gang activity on the increase resulting in thefts from motor vehicles.

### **MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**

### **Decreases:**

- Stronger sentencing of career criminals has been effective.
- Modern ignition systems and anti-theft devices act as a deterrent.
- Better lighting in parking lots has helped decrease motor vehicle thefts.


### Increases:

- The tremendous replacement cost of auto parts has contributed significantly to the increase in motor vehicle thefts for the purpose of auto parts resale.
- Motor vehicle theft for export to overseas markets has become prevalent.



## **STATEWIDE CRIME SUMMARY - 2015**

### CRIME INDEX - VOLUME/RATE

- There were 168,611 Index offenses in 2015, a 5 percent decrease compared to 2014.
- The crime rate of the state is 19 victims for every 1,000 permanent inhabitants, a decrease of 5 percent compared to 2014.

### ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- August with 16,695 offenses reported, recorded the highest incidence of Crime Index offenses while February was the lowest with 10,207 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen amounted to \$289.7 million in 2015, a decrease of 3 percent from 2014.
- Value of property recovered was \$79.7 million, a recovery rate of 28 percent.
- Stolen motor vehicles accounted for 40 percent of stolen property and 86 percent of the recovered property value.

### CRIME INDEX ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 39,126 persons were arrested for Index offenses, which represents a 6 percent decrease compared to 2014.
- Adult Index arrests decreased 5 percent and juvenile Index arrests decreased 11 percent.
- Crime Index arrests accounted for 13 percent of the total arrests in 2015.
- Males accounted for 69 percent of the Crime Index arrests and females accounted for 31 percent.
- Fifty-eight percent of the Index arrests were white, 40 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 20 percent of the arrests for Index offenses.
- Police cleared 22 percent of the Index offenses and juveniles accounted for 9 percent of those clearances.

### **VIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY**

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault.

### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 22,899 violent crimes reported in 2015, a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to the violent crimes reported in 2014.
- Violent crimes accounted for 14 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The violent crime rate remained unchanged in 2015.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The highest number of violent crimes were reported in August with 2,178 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 1,294 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of violent crime was \$8.6 million in 2015 a decrease of 10 percent from 2014.

### ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 10,352 violent crime arrests, a decrease of 3 percent compared to 2014.
- Violent crime arrests accounted for 26 percent of the Index arrests and 3 percent of the total arrests during the year
- Adult arrests for violent crime decreased 3 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 6 percent.
- Adults accounted for 85 percent of the violent crime arrests while the remaining 15 percent were juveniles.
- Males accounted for 80 percent of the violent crime arrests and females accounted for 20 percent.
- Forty-seven percent of those arrests were white, 52 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- Hispanics accounted for 25 percent of the arrests for violent crimes.
- Forty percent of violent crimes were cleared and juveniles accounted for 12 percent of those clearances.

## NONVIOLENT CRIME SUMMARY

This category consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, Larceny-Theft, Motor Vehicle Theft.

### **VOLUME/RATE/TREND**

- There were 145,712 nonviolent crimes reported in 2015, a 6 percent decrease compared to nonviolent crimes reported in 2014.
- Nonviolent crimes accounted for 86 percent of the total Crime Index.
- The nonviolent crime rate decreased 6 percent to 16.3 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants in 2015.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The highest number of nonviolent crimes were reported in August with 14,517 offenses while the lowest number was reported in February with 8,913 offenses.
- The total value of property stolen as a result of nonviolent crime was \$281.1 million in 2015 a decrease of 3 percent from 2014.

### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- There were 28,774 nonviolent crime arrests, a decrease of 7 percent compared to 2014.
- Nonviolent crime arrests accounted for 74 percent of the Index arrests and 10 percent of the total arrests during 2015.
- Juveniles were responsible for 11 percent of the nonviolent crime arrests and adults 89 percent.
- Adult arrests for nonviolent crimes decreased 6 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 13 percent.

- Males represented 66 percent and females 34 percent of persons arrested for nonviolent crime.
- Sixty-two percent of all persons arrested for nonviolent crimes were white, 35 percent were black and 3 p ercent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 18 percent of the arrests for nonviolent crimes.
- Nineteen percent of all nonviolent crimes reported were cleared in 2015, and juveniles accounted for 8 percent of those clearances.

## **TOTAL ARREST SUMMARY**

- There were 302,856 persons arrested in 2015, which represents a decrease of 5 percent compared to 2014.
- The arrest rate for 2015 decreased 6 p ercent with 34 persons arrested per every 1,000 inhabitants.
- Adult arrests decreased 5 percent to 281,445 and juvenile arrests decreased 12 percent to 21,411 in 2015.
- Adults accounted for 93 percent and juveniles 7 percent of the total state arrests.
- Persons under 21 years of age accounted for 17 percent of the total state arrests.
- Males accounted for 73 percent and females 27 percent of the total persons arrested during the year.
- Sixty percent of total persons arrested in 2015 were white, 39 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic orgin accounted for 19 percent of the arrests.

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## POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED SUMMARY

- There were no police officers feloniously killed in the line of duty in 2015.
- New Jersey reported 1,735 police officers assaulted in the line of duty in 2015.

## CRIME IN NEW JERSEY, UNITED STATES AND THE NORTHEAST REGION

- Violent crime in New Jersey decreased 0.5 percent compared to the previous year, while the Northeast Region decreased 0.9 percent overall. Violent crime in the United States increased by 3.8 percent overall.
- Nonviolent crime in New Jersey decreased 6 percent, while the Northeast Region decreased 6.8 percent overall. Nonviolent crime in the United States decreased 2.6 percent when compared to the 2014 figure.

## MURDER

### **Definition:**

Murder is defined as the unlawful killing of a human being with malice aforethought. Any death due to a fight, argument, quarrel, assault, or commission of a crime is included. This Index offense is counted by police on the basis of their investigation without regard to findings of a court, jury or the decision of a prosecutor. Attempts to kill, are scored as aggravated assaults and not as murder. Suicides, accidental deaths, negligent manslaughters, and justifiable homicides are not counted, nor reflected in the murder classification.

### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 369 murders reported to law enforcement agencies of the state in 2015, a 4 percent increase compared to the 354 murders reported in 2014.
- Murders accounted for less than one percent of the reported index offenses, and 2 percent of the violent crime.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The age group of 20-24 accounted for 19 percent of all murder victims.
- Firearms were used in 72 percent of the murders, knives or cutting instruments in 11 percent, blunt objects in 7 percent, and physical force in 5 percent.
- Seventeen percent of the offenders were friends or acquaintances of the victim, while 9 percent were strangers, and 6 percent were relatives.
- Felony murders accounted for 18 percent of all murder circumstances. Robbery was the motive in 44 percent of the 67 felony murders.
- Sixty-five murders were recorded on Sunday for the high, while Monday was the lowest, with 41.
- July recorded the highest number of murders 41, while February recorded the lowest 15.
- Fifty-five percent of the murders occurred on highways or streets, 12 percent in single family dwellings, and 18 percent in multi-family apartment dwellings.
- Forty-nine domestic violence murders were recorded in 2015.
- Drug-related and/or gang related circumstances accounted for 6 percent (23) of all murders.

### ARRESTS/CLEARANCES


- A total of 196 persons were arrested for murder in 2015, a 26 percent decrease compared to 2014.
- Adult murder arrests decreased 29 percent (from 244 to 174) while juvenile arrests increased 10 percent (from 20 to 22).
- Sixty-two percent of persons arrested for murder were black and 37 percent were white.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 27 percent of the arrests.

Forty-seven percent of the murders were cleared in 2015 (174 out of 369). Juveniles accounted for 7 percent of those cases cleared.

Males accounted for 94 percent and females 6 percent of those arrested for murder.





# MURDER DISTRIBUTION BY TYPE OF WEAPON 2015




## **RELATIONSHIP OF MURDER VICTIMS TO OFFENDER**

## RAPE

### **Definition:**

Rape is defined as the penetration, no matter how slight, of the vagina or anus with any body part or object, or oral penetration by a sex organ of another person, without the consent of the victim.

### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 1,362 reported rapes in 2015, a 43 percent increase compared to the 950 in 2014.\*
- Rape accounted for 1 percent of the total Crime Index and 6 percent of all violent crimes.

### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- Ninety-six percent of the rapes were forcible, the remaining 4 percent were attempts to rape.
- The total value of property stolen during rapes amounted to \$6,077.

### ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 376 persons were arrested for rape in 2015, a 16 percent increase compared to 2014.
- Adult rape arrests increased 18 percent, and juvenile arrests increased 10 percent.
- Sixty-five percent of the persons arrested for rape were white, 34 percent were black and 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 36 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty percent of all persons arrested for rape were between 25 and 39.
- Thirty-three percent of rape cases were cleared in 2015. Juveniles accounted for 15 percent of those cases cleared.

### ROBBERY

#### **Definition:**

Robbery is defined as the felonious and forcible taking of the property of another, against his will, by violence or by putting him in fear. The element of personal confrontation is always present in this crime. Under the program, all assaults or attempts to rob are included.

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 9,743 robbery offenses in 2015, a decrease of 7 percent compared to 2014.
- Robbery accounted for 6 percent of the total Crime Index and 43 percent of all violent crimes.
- The robbery rate decreased to 1.1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 2015.

#### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- Highway robberies accounted for 65 percent of all reported robberies.
- Convenience store robberies decreased 9 percent, while highway robberies decreased 7 percent.
- The total value of property stolen during robberies amounted to \$8,610,345.

#### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**



### **CARJACKING HIGHLIGHTS**

Highlights of carjacking offense statistics for 2015 are listed below:

- There were 186 carjacking offenses reported to the police; which involved 197 victims, including passengers.
- Carjackings decreased 7% when comparing 2015 to 2014 reported offenses.
- Eighteen of the 565 municipalities in New Jersey reported carjackings.
- Firearms were involved in 69% (128) of all carjackings. Less than one-half of one percent (1) of the firearms used were assault firearms. Shootings were involved in 2 percent (5) of all carjackings.
- New Jersey registered vehicles represented 85% (158) of all carjackings. Nissan represented the most frequently carjacked vehicle at 11%. The most frequently targeted vehicle year was 2014 with 10% (19).
- Seventy-two percent (133) of all carjacked vehicles were recovered. The average value of a carjacked motor vehicle was \$11,844.
- Carjackings occurred in a residential area 82% (152) of the time. The hours of darkness (6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.) accounted for 68% (126) of all carjackings.
- Ten percent (19) of all carjackings were witnessed.
- The most frequent victim age group was 30-34, which accounted for 25% (49) of the victim total (197). Seventy-two percent (141) of all victims were male. Sixty-three percent (125) of all victims were black.
- The total number of offenders was 314. Insufficient analysis information was supplied on 69% (216) of the offenders. Of all known offenders (98), 20-24 was the most frequent offender age group and accounted for 46% (45). Ninety-four percent (92) of all known offenders were male. Ninety-four percent (92) of all known offenders were black.
- Of the total arrests for carjacking (11), adults accounted for 100% (11).
- August had the highest number of offenses with 24, accounting for 13% of all carjacking offenses.
- Saturday recorded the highest number of offenses with (36), accounting for 19% of all carjackings.
- Region I, which consists of Essex, Hudson, and Union counties, accounted for 83% (154) of all carjackings.
- No murders were reported in 2015 as a result of carjacking.
- Four percent (8) of all carjackings (186) were cleared by arrest.

### AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

#### Definition:

Aggravated assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an attempt or offer, with unlawful force or violence, to do serious physical injury to another. Attempts are included since it is not necessary that an injury result when a firearm, knife, or other weapon is used which could result in serious personal injury if the crime was successfully completed.

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 11,425 reported aggravated assaults in 2015, an increase of 2 percent compared to 2014.
- Aggravated assault accounted for 7 percent of the total Crime Index and 50 percent of all violent crimes.
- The rate for aggravated assault in 2015 remained at 1.3 victims per 1,000 inhabitants compared to 2014.

#### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- The categories of physical force (i.e. hands, fists, and feet) and other dangerous weapons (i.e. clubs, bricks, tire irons, etc.) were used in 60 percent of all reported aggravated assaults.
- Firearms were used in 18 percent of all aggravated assaults committed.



### BURGLARY

#### **DEFINITION:**

Under this program, burglary is defined as an unlawful entry or attempted entry of any structure to commit a felony or larceny. Data collection for this offense is further categorized as forcible entry, unlawful entry (where no force is used) and attempted forcible entry.

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 27,890 reported burglary offenses in 2015, a 12 percent decrease compared to 2014.
- Burglary accounted for 17 percent of the total Crime Index and 19 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The burglary rate decreased to 3.1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 2015.

#### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- Fifty-five percent of all burglaries involved forcible entry, 34 percent were unlawful entry where no force was used and attempts to forcibly enter accounted for 11 percent in 2015.
- Residences were targets in 72 percent of the reported burglaries.
- Forty-six percent of nonresidential burglaries are known to have occurred between the hours of 6:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m.
- Stolen property as a result of burglary statewide, amounted to \$63.6 million, for an average loss of \$2,282.
- The average loss as a result of residential burglaries was \$2,180 and of nonresidential burglaries was \$2,550.

#### ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Burglary arrests decreased 12 percent with 4,564 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests decreased 12 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 17 percent.
- Males accounted for 86 percent, and females 14 percent of the burglary arrests. Juveniles accounted for 14 percent of all burglary arrests.
- Sixty-four percent of all persons arrested for burglary were white, 35 percent were black, and the remaining 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 20 percent of the arrests.
- Fourteen percent of the burglaries statewide were cleared and juveniles accounted for 9 percent of those clearances.

### LARCENY-THEFT

#### **Definition:**

The definition of larceny-theft, as provided under this program, is the taking of the property of another with intent to deprive him of ownership. All larcenies and thefts resulting from pocketpicking, purse-snatching, shoplifting, larcenies from motor vehicles, thefts or motor vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, etc., are included here. Embezzlement, unlawful conversions, larceny by bailee, frauds or bad checks are not included.

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 106,059 larcenies reported in 2015, a decrease of 5 percent compared to 2014.
- Larceny accounted for 63 percent of the total Crime Index and 73 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The rate for larceny decreased to 11.9 victims per 1,000 inhabitants in 2015.

#### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- Theft of motor vehicle parts and accessories and thefts from motor vehicles collectively accounted for 24 percent of all larceny-theft reported.
- Shoplifting offenses decreased less than one-half of one percent when compared to 2014.
- Theft from buildings accounted for 17 percent of all larceny-thefts reported.

#### ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- Larceny arrests decreased 6 percent in 2015 with 23,549 persons arrested.
- Adult arrests decreased 6 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 12 percent.
- Males accounted for 61 percent, and females 39 percent of the larceny arrests.
- Sixty-two percent of all persons arrested for larceny were white, 35 percent were black, and the remaining 3 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 18 percent of the arrests.
- Twenty-two percent of the larcenies were cleared with juveniles accounting for 8 percent of those clearances.

### **MOTOR VEHICLE THEFT**

#### **Definition:**

In Uniform Crime Reporting, motor vehicle theft includes all thefts and attempted thefts of motor vehicles. This includes the theft or attempted theft of motor vehicle which is defined as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on the rails. This definition excludes taking a motor vehicle for temporary use, such as a family situation, or unauthorized use by others having lawful access to the vehicle. This motor vehicle theft category includes the subheadings of auto, trucks and buses, and other vehicles (motorcycles, mopeds, etc.)

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 11,763 motor vehicle thefts reported in 2015, a increase of less than 1 percent compared to 2014.
- Motor vehicle theft accounted for 7 percent of the total Crime Index and 8 percent of all nonviolent crimes.
- The motor vehicle theft rate of 1.3 victims per 1,000 inhabitants is unchanged from 2014.

#### ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Motor vehicles represented 40 percent of the total value of property stolen during 2015.
- Total value of stolen motor vehicles amounted to \$117 million during the year.
- The average value of a stolen motor vehicle was \$9,774.
- Recovered vehicle values totaling \$69 million represent 86 percent of the total value of recovered property.


#### ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- A total of 661 persons arrested for Motor Vehicle Theft, this represents an increase of 17 percent compared to 2014.
- Adult arrests increased 24 percent and juvenile arrests decreased 9 percent.
- Males accounted for 76 percent, and females 24 percent of the motor vehicle theft arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of all persons arrested for motor vehicle theft were white and 38 percent were black.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 20 percent of the arrests.
- Six percent of motor vehicle thefts were cleared in 2015; juveniles accounted for 11 percent of those clearances.

### ARSON

#### **Definition:**

Arson is defined by the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting program as any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intent to defraud, a dwelling, house, public building, motor vehicle or aircraft, personal property of another, etc. Only fires determined through investigation to have been willfully or maliciously set are classified as arsons. Fires of suspicious or unknown origins are excluded.

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- There were 597 arsons reported in 2015, which represents a decrease of 10 percent compared to 2014.
- The arson rate remained unchanged at 0.1 victims per 1,000 inhabitants.

#### ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS

- Fifty-six percent of arsons were structures, with single occupancy residences accounting for 24 percent.
- Mobile property, including motor vehicles, accounted for 24 percent of the arsons in the state.
- Other property (timber, crops, etc.) accounted for 20 percent of the reported arsons.
- Total value of property damage due to arson amounted to \$8.6 million, for an average loss of \$14,373.
- The average residential loss was \$30,707, while the average loss to industrial/commercial structures was \$19,181.
- The average loss to mobile property was \$7,253.

#### **ARRESTS/CLEARANCES**

- Arson arrests numbered 174 in 2015 representing a 20 percent decrease, compared to 2014.
- Adult arrests decreased 31 percent, and juvenile arrests decreased 5 percent.
- Males accounted for 80 percent, and females for 20 percent of the arson arrests.
- Juveniles accounted for 49 percent of all arsons arrests.
- Seventy-one percent of the persons arrested for arson were white, 28 percent were black, and the remaining 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 26 percent of the arrests.
- The arson clearance rate was 27 percent, and juveniles accounted for 35 percent of those clearances.

## ARREST SUMMARY FOR NON-INDEX OFFENSES MANSLAUGHTER

#### **Definition:**

The unlawful killing of a human being by another through gross negligence. Arrests relating to traffic fatalities are included.

- There were 10 arrests for manslaughter, a decrease of 55 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 80 percent and juveniles accounted for 20 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 100 percent and females 0 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 40 percent were black, and 10 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 10 percent of the arrests and 90 percent were non-Hispanic.

## SIMPLE ASSAULT

#### **Definition:**

Simple assault, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting System, is an assault or an attempted assault where no weapon is used and which does not result in serious or aggravated injury to the victim.

- There were 22,485 arrests for simple assault, an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 92 percent and juveniles accounted for 8 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 72 percent and females 28 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-two percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 36 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 24 percent of the arrests and 76 percent were non-Hispanic.

### ARSON

#### **Definition:**

Under this program, arson is defined as the willful or malicious burning, or attempting to burn, with or without intent to defraud; a dwelling, house, building, ship or vessel, motor vehicle or aircraft, contents of building, personal property of another, etc.

- There were 174 arrests for arson, a decrease of 21 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 51 percent and juveniles accounted for 49 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 80 percent and females 20 percent of the arrests.
- Seventy-one percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 28 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 27 percent of the arrests and 73 percent were non-Hispanic.

## FORGERY AND COUNTERFEITING

#### **Definition:**

The definition of forgery and counterfeiting is the making, altering, uttering or possessing or attempting to make, alter, utter or possess, with intent to defraud, anything false which is made to appear true.

- There were 1,075 arrests for forgery and counterfeiting, a decrease of 11 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 97 percent and juveniles accounted for 3 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 66 percent and females 34 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 47 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 20 percent of the arrests and 80 percent were non-Hispanic.

### FRAUD

#### **Definition:**

In Uniform Crime Reporting, fraud is the fraudulent conversion and obtaining money or property by false pretenses. This includes bad checks, confidence games, etc., except forgeries and counterfeiting.

- There were 3,803 arrests for fraud, a decrease of 27 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 98 percent and juveniles accounted for 2 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 69 percent and females 31 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-five percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 42 percent were black, and 3 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 20 percent of the arrests and 80 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **EMBEZZLEMENT**

#### **Definition:**

The definition of embezzlement is the misappropriation or misapplication of money or property entrusted to one's care, custody or control.

- There were 293 arrests for embezzlement, a decrease of 11 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 97 percent and juveniles accounted for 3 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 56 percent and females 44 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 37 percent were black, and 4 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 22 percent of the arrests and 78 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **STOLEN PROPERTY**

#### (Buying, Receiving, Possessing)

#### **Definition:**

Included in this class are all offenses of buying, receiving, and possessing stolen property, as well as all attempts to commit any of these offenses.

- There were 2,459 arrests for stolen property, a decrease of 13 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 81 percent and juveniles accounted for 19 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 78 percent and females 22 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-five percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 54 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 18 percent of the arrests and 82 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **CRIMINAL/MALICIOUS MISCHIEF**

#### **Definition:**

Criminal/Malicious mischief is defined as the willful destruction, injury, disfigurement, or defacement of property without consent of the owner or persons having custody or control.

- There were 4,025 arrests for criminal/malicious mischief, an increase of 3 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 78 percent and juveniles accounted for 22 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 80 percent and females 20 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-five percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 34 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 20 percent of the arrests and 80 percent were non-Hispanic.

## WEAPONS: CARRYING, POSSESSING, etc.

#### **Definition:**

Under this program, this offense includes all the violations of regulations or statute controlling the carrying, using, possessing, furnishing, and manufacturing of deadly weapons or silencers, and attempts.

- There were 3,853 arrests for weapons, a decrease of 2 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 82 percent and juveniles accounted for 18 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 86 percent and females 14 percent of the arrests.
- Forty-four percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 55 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 19 percent of the arrests and 81 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **PROSTITUTION AND COMMERCIALIZED VICE**

#### **Definition:**

Prostitution and commercialized vice are sex offenses of a commercialized nature and attempts. Included in this category are prostitution, keeping a bawdy house, procuring or transporting women for immoral purposes, etc.

- There were 806 arrests for prostitution and commercialized vice, a decrease of 17 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 98 percent and juveniles accounted for 2 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 29 percent and females 71 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-six percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 31 percent were black, and 13 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 17 percent of the arrests and 83 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **SEX OFFENSES**

#### **Definition:**

Sex offenses, as defined under the New Jersey Uniform Crime Reporting Program, do not include rape, prostitution and commercialized vice. Included in this class are offenses against chastity, common decency, morals, and the like; attempts are also included.

- There were 1,035 arrests for sex offenses (except forcible rape and prostitution), a decrease of 13 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 85 percent and juveniles accounted for 15 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 90 percent and females 10 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-eight percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 28 percent were black, and 4 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 31 percent of the arrests and 69 percent were non-Hispanic.


## **DRUG ABUSE VIOLATIONS**

#### **Definition:**

Under the program, drug abuse violations are defined as the unlawful sale/manufacturing/possession/use of the below listed narcotics and drugs:

- a. Opium or Cocaine and their derivatives (Morphine, Heroin, Codeine).
- b. Marijuana, Hashish, etc.
- c. Synthetic narcotics: manufactured narcotics which can cause true drug addiction (Demerol, Methadone).
- d. Other: dangerous non-narcotic drugs (Barbiturates, Amphetamines, Hallucinogens).
- There were 52,898 arrests for drug abuse violations, a decrease of 4 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 93 percent and juveniles accounted for 7 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-two percent of persons arrested for drug abuse violations were age 21 and under.


- Males accounted for 78 percent and females 22 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty-one percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 37 percent were black and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 18 percent of the arrests and 82 were non-Hispanic.
- Arrests for possession/use of drugs accounted for 80 percent of the arrests, and the remaining 20 percent were for the sale/manufacturing of drugs.
- Arrests for opium or cocaine and their derivatives represented 31 percent of the possession/use category and 59 percent of the sale/ manufacturing category. Overall, they accounted for 37 percent of the total drug abuse violation arrests.

## GAMBLING

#### **Definition:**

Gambling violations are defined as the promoting, permitting or engaging in illegal gambling.

- There were 351 arrests reported for gambling, an increase of 38 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 92 percent and juveniles accounted for 8 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 42 percent and females 58 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-four percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 42 percent were black, and 4 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 23 percent of the arrests and 77 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **OFFENSES AGAINST FAMILY AND CHILDREN**

#### **Definition:**

The definition of offenses against family and children is the nonsupport, neglect, desertion or abuse of family and children.

- There were 9,828 arrests for offenses against family and children, a decrease of 3 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 99 percent and juveniles accounted for 1 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 87 percent and females 13 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-two percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 47 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 16 percent of the arrests and 84 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE**

#### **Definition:**

Under the New Jersey Crime Reporting Program, the offense of driving under the influence is defined as the driving or operating of any motor vehicle while drunk or under the influence of alcohol or narcotics.

- There were 23,719 arrests reported for driving under the influence, a decrease of 1 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 99 percent and juveniles accounted for 1 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 63 percent and females 37 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty-one percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 16 percent were black, and 3 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 24 percent of the arrests and 76 percent were non-Hispanic.

## LIQUOR LAWS

#### **Definition:**

Included in this category are state or local liquor law violations, with the exception of 'driving under the influence'.

- There were 3,885 arrests for liquor laws, a decrease of 10 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 79 percent and juveniles accounted for 21 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 68 percent and females 32 percent of the arrests.
- Eighty-eight percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 10 percent were black, and 2 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 10 percent of the arrests and 90 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **DISORDERLY CONDUCT**

#### **Definition:**

Included in this category are all charges of committing a breach of the peace (disorderly person).

- There were 12,988 arrests for disorderly conduct, a decrease of 15 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 88 percent and juveniles accounted for 12 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 76 percent and females 24 percent of the arrests.
- Sixty percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 39 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 19 percent of the arrests and 81 percent were non-Hispanic.

## VAGRANCY

#### **Definition:**

In this category are persons charged with vagabondage, begging, loitering, etc.

- There were 674 arrests for vagrancy, an increase of 92 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 96 percent and juveniles accounted for 4 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 82 percent and females 18 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 49 percent were black, and less than 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 20 percent of the arrests and 80 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **ALL OTHER OFFENSES**

#### **Definition:**

Included in this category are all violations of state and local laws, except those offenses that can be categorized into one of the specific crime classifications previously mentioned.

- There were 115,780 arrests for all other offenses (except traffic), a decrease of 5 percent compared to 2014.
- Adults accounted for 98 percent and juveniles accounted for 2 percent of the arrests.
- Males accounted for 73 percent and females 27 percent of the arrests.
- Fifty-six percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, 42 percent were black, and 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 17 percent of the arrests and 83 percent were non-Hispanic.

## **CURFEW AND LOITERING LAW VIOLATIONS**

#### **Definition:**

In this category are juvenile arrests made for violations of local curfew or loitering ordinances.

- There were 1,416 arrests for curfew and loitering law violations, a decrease of 22 percent compared to 2014.
- Males accounted for 74 percent and females 26 percent of the arrests.
- Thirty-seven percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, and 63 percent were black, and less than 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 27 percent of the arrests and 73 percent were non-Hispanic.

### **RUNAWAYS**

#### **Definition:**

For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, this category is limited to juveniles taken into protective custody, under provisions of local statutes, as runaways.

- There were 2,172 arrests for runaways, a decrease of 9 percent compared to 2014.
- Males accounted for 49 percent and females 51 percent of the arrests.
- Forty percent of persons arrested in 2015 were white, and 60 percent were black, and less than 1 percent were other races.
- The Hispanic ethnic origin accounted for 32 percent of the arrests and 68 percent were non-Hispanic.

#### **Atlantic County**

#### **VOLUME/RATE**

- A total of 8,899 Crime Index Offenses were reported to the police of Atlantic County during 2015, a 3 percent decrease compared to 2014.
- Violent crimes increased 7 percent while the nonviolent crime category decreased 5 percent.
- The crime rate for Atlantic County was recorded at 32.4 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants, a decrease of 3 percent compared to the previous year.
- Murder increased 11 percent from 18 in 2014 to 20 in 2015. Rape increased 4 percent from 55 in 2014 to 57 in 2015.
- Robbery increased 5 percent from 489 in 2014 to 515 in 2015. Burglary decreased 13 percent from 1,650 in 2014 to 1,444 in 2015.
- Aggravated assault increased 9 percent from 502 in 2014 to 547 in 2015.
- The total value of property stolen in Atlantic County amounted to \$10,554,069, of which 19.9 percent was recovered.

#### ARRESTS/CLEARANCES

- There were 11,696 persons arrested during 2015, a decrease of 12 percent compared to 2014.
- Adult arrests decreased 10 percent to 10,984 and juvenile arrests decreased 27 percent to 712 compared to 2014.
- The total clearance rate for Index offenses was 24 percent; juveniles were responsible for 7 percent of those cases cleared.

#### **Bergen County**

#### **VOLUME/RATE**

- A total of 9,875 Crime Index Offenses were reported to the police of Bergen County during 2015, a 6 percent decrease compared to 2014.
- Violent crimes decreased 2 percent while the nonviolent crime category decreased 7 percent.
- The crime rate for Bergen County was recorded at 10.7 victims for every 1,000 inhabitants, a decrease of 6 percent compared to the previous year.
- Murder increased 33 percent from 9 in 2014 to 12 in 2015. Rape increased 114 percent from 37 in 2014 to 79 in 2015.
- Robbery decreased 19 percent from 259 in 2014 to 209 in 2015. Burglary increased 10 percent from 1,319 in 2014 to 1,454 in 2015.
- Aggravated assault decreased 2 percent from 455 in 2014 to 446 in 2015.


## **CRIME INDEX FOR POPULATION GROUPS – 2015**

The presentation of crime statistics by population groups was made for the purpose of projecting, for consideration, the relative crime experience of communities of varying populations. Although the individual municipalities within the various groups may be geographically separated, their inclusion into a specific group was predicated by the similarity in population with the other municipalities within the group. Municipalities within the same group may differ widely when all factors are considered, but they do share the common bond of population size. The grouping of communities in this manner allows recognition of variances in the crime volumes, rates and clearances between the established groups.

Set forth below are the established municipal groupings as used in this section:

## CRIME IN THE CITIES

## **CRIME IN THE CITIES**

This section deals with serious crimes reported in the large urban cities of the state. These cities represent 19 percent of the population and historically account for one third of the reported Crime Index of the state.

This analysis involves the latest ten-year period 2006-2015 and endeavors further to identify crime trends in these urban areas.

The cities included in this analysis were initially categorized as urban municipalities (*i.e.*, densely populated with extensive development) by the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Division of State and Regional Planning, Bureau of Statewide Planning, and will continue to be used for comparative purposes.

The criteria used in the selection of these cities were (1) classified as urban character and (2) have a population of 50,000 or more inhabitants.

For further comparative analysis, the urban cities were subdivided into two distinct groupings.

Group number one consisted of the state's six largest urban centers with populations of 80,000 or over and is categorized as "Major Urban."

The second group included the "Major Urban" and the additional urban communities with populations of 50,000 or more inhabitants, and is referred to as the "Urban 15."

- During the ten-year period 2006/2015, the Total Crime Index in New Jersey has decreased 27 percent, while the "Urban 15" cities decreased 29 percent and the six "Major Urban" cities decreased 28 percent.
- Violent crime in the state decreased 25 percent, the "Urban 15" cities decreased 24 percent, while the six "Major Urban" cities experienced a decrease of 17 percent.
- Nonviolent crime in the state decreased 27 percent, the "Urban 15" cities decreased 31 percent and the six "Major Urban" cities decreased 31 percent.

#### **Distribution:**

- Six major urban centers Camden, Newark, Jersey City, Trenton, Paterson and Elizabeth collectively represent 11 percent of New Jersey's total population. These same urban centers, during the period 2006 through 2015 accounted for 21 percent of the state's total Crime Index.
- "Major Urban" centers from 2006 through 2015 accounted for 40 percent of all violent crime and 18 percent of the nonviolent crimes in the entire state.
- The "Urban 15" municipalities represent 18 percent of the state's total population.
- "Urban 15" municipalities accounted for 30 percent of New Jersey's total Crime Index. Violent crime was 52 percent of the state total, while nonviolent crime was 27 percent of the state total during this ten-year period.
- Sixty-seven percent of all reported murders occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during this ten-year period.

## STREET CRIME

There has never been a clear-cut definition for street crime within the criminal justice system. The nation's clearinghouse for the collection and dissemination of criminal statistics, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has no criteria in the categorization of specific crimes to be designated or defined as "street crimes." More and more, this media term has been confused with the violent crime group of murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.

Although any particular crime can and does occur on the street, this analysis, because of reporting constraints within the Uniform Crime Reporting System, is limited to defining street crimes as those offenses which occur, or are most likely to occur, on streets, highways, parking lots, etc. These crimes include highway robbery, purse-snatching, theft from autos, theft of auto parts and accessories, theft of bicycles, and motor vehicle thefts. All are crimes against property and only one, highway robbery, falls in the violent crime group.

- During the ten-year period 2006-2015, the "Urban 15" cities accounted for 39.5 percent of the street crimes in the state.
- Sixty-nine percent of all highway robberies in the state occurred in the "Urban 15" cities during the ten-year period.
- Fifty-seven percent of all motor vehicle thefts during the survey span occurred in these 15 urban municipalities.
- Twenty-six percent of all purse-snatchings during the survey span were perpetrated in the "Urban 15" cities.
- In 2015, highway robbery and motor vehicle thefts were at the lowest levels in this ten-year period.
- The accompanying table reflects percent distribution of street crime for the "Urban 15" cities for the years 2006-2015.

# Section Eight RESORT MUNICIPALITIES

As required by P.L. 1998, c. 50, annual mean population estimates for resort municipalities in New Jersey have been used in the preparation of per capita crime statistics.

These estimates were prepared based upon the methodology prescribed in P.L. 1998, c. 50 using the latest available municipality estimates of year-round population from the U.S. Bureau of the Census. Please note that these resort population estimates should only be used for crime statistics purposes. While they fulfill the requirements of the law, the seasonal components of these estimates are not a complete measure of seasonal population because they include only those living in rental housing units or in vacant year-round housing. Not counted are the many day visitors and persons who occupy campgrounds, hotels, motels or bed and breakfast establishments or who stay with friends or relatives.



#### POLICE EMPLOYEE DATA

The Uniform Crime Reporting Program of New Jersey incorporates the collection of pertinent data relating to the police of the state. Information regarding police employees strength and trends are discussed in this section.

Individual listings of full-time state, county, university and college police departments are shown in tables within this section. Listings of municipal police departments will be found in Section VII.

The determination of police strength for any given area or municipality should be subject for serious consideration. Such consideration, however, should be based on the numerous factors which create the need for police services. For example, the increased need for police services in a municipality which has highly mobile or seasonal population differs from a municipality which has a relatively stable population. Some other factors, discussed elsewhere in this publication, relate to size, density of population, geographic location, character, and proximity to metropolitan areas. The tables and charts shown in this section should not be interpreted as recommended strength for any given municipality.

#### **TOTAL POLICE EMPLOYEES**

- Total police employees are defined as the total number of full-time police officers and civilian police employees (clerks, dispatchers, mechanics, etc.) employed by all law enforcement agencies in the state.
- During 2015 there were 46,071 full-time police employees in New Jersey. This represents an increase of 1 percent compared to 2014.
- The number of full-time police officers increased 1 percent from 36,070 in 2014 to 36,290 in 2015.
- The number of full-time civilian employees increased 1 percent, from 9,645 in 2014 to 9,781 in 2015.
- Seventy-nine percent were sworn officers and the remaining 21 percent were civilian employees.

#### **MUNICIPAL POLICE EMPLOYEES**

This category consists of the number of police employees, including civilian personnel, employed full-time by the municipalities of the state.

- During 2015 there were 23,738 municipal police employees, an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to the 23,707 in 2014.
- For every 1,000 inhabitants of the state there were 2.7 municipal police employees. Ocean County reported the largest increase in municipal police employees, an increase of 6 percent (78 employees).
- Cape May County recorded the highest police employee rate; 4.3 per 1,000 population; (this rate is computed on the static population and does not take into account the large influx of seasonal and recreational population).
- Hunterdon and Warren Counties recorded the lowest police employee rate; 1.5 per 1,000 population.

## **MUNICIPAL CIVILIAN POLICE EMPLOYEES**

The personnel of each department differ as to the demands and responsibilities placed before them. Many police officers are fully occupied with clerical tasks and are not free to perform active police duties. Employing civilians in police departments to perform clerical duties is in line with the thinking of many police administrators who recommended the use of civilians in this capacity, thus freeing the sworn personnel for actual police services.

- There were 3,967 municipal civilian police employees in 2015, a decrease of 3 percent when compared to the 4,061 in 2014.
- Seventeen percent of all municipal police employees were civilians.

### **MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS**

This includes the number of sworn police officers employed full-time by the municipalities of the state. The police employee rate per 1,000 population presented here should not be construed as recommended ratios. The determination of police strength for any municipality should be based on the numerous factors that create the need for police services. These factors such as crime, vary in type and degree from place to place. Some examples are: seasonal population, geographic location, density and composition of the population.

- There were 19,771 full-time municipal police officers in 2015; this represents an increase of 1 percent compared to the 19,646 full-time municipal police officers in 2014.
- The number of full-time police officers was calculated at 2.2 per 1,000 population; this resulted in no change compared to 2014.
- Sworn officers represented 83 percent of all municipal police employees.
- Hudson County recorded the largest numerical increase (73) officers which represented a 4 percent increase of municipal police officers.
- Camden County recorded the largest numerical decrease (75) officers which represented a 6 percent decrease of municipal police officers.
- Cape May County with 3.4 police officers per 1,000, inhabitants, recorded the highest rate of full-time municipal police officers.
- Hunterdon and Sussex County recorded the lowest rate of full-time municipal officers with 1.3 police officers per 1,000 population.

#### **OTHER POLICE (State Agencies)**

In addition to the State Police, there are nine other state agencies reporting to the system. These agencies consist of: New Jersey Forest Fire Service, Department of Corrections, Department of Human Services, Division of Criminal Justice, Division of Fish and Wildlife, Palisades Interstate Parkway, Port Authority NY/NJ, New Jersey Transit Police, and New Jersey State Park Police. No rates were computed due to the variations in the types of police services rendered, and their statewide jurisdictions.

- Together, these agencies reported a total of 8,775 full-time employees; an increase of less than 1 percent compared to the 8,682 police employees in 2014.
- There were 8,057 sworn police officers in 2015, an increase of less than 1 percent compared to the 8,018 in 2014.
- Ninety-two percent were sworn personnel, while the remaining 8 percent were civilians.

## **COUNTY POLICE, SHERIFFS AND PROSECUTORS**

The functions of county law enforcement vary widely throughout the state. The operation of one sheriff's department may be limited exclusively to civil areas and the administration of the county jail, or they may be actively involved in investigating criminal matters throughout the county.

County police departments are varied in their activities in that some are responsible for enforcement throughout the county, while others may have as their primary mission the policing of county parklands. The responsibilities of the county prosecutor's office includes criminal investigations, trial preparation, court presentation and special probes. Because of the difference in the types of police services rendered, rates for county law enforcement agencies are not presented here.

- County law enforcement agencies reported a total of 8,557 full-time police employees in 2015; a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to 8,577 in 2014.
- There were 5,363 full-time sworn police officers employed by county agencies in 2015. This represents a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to 5,389 in 2014.
- County police agencies reported 3,194 civilian police employees in 2015; an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 3,188 civilian employees in 2014.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 63 percent while the remaining 37 percent were civilians.

#### **STATE POLICE**

The New Jersey State Police is empowered to provide all phases of law enforcement throughout the state. It also renders, upon request, police services to all the law enforcement agencies in the state. No rates are used due to the variations in the nature and extent of the police services performed by the State Police.

- The New Jersey State Police reported 3,828 full-time police employees; an increase of less than one-half of one percent compared to 3,811 in 2014.
- State Police employed 2,606 officers in 2015, an increase of 1 percent compared to 2,585 in 2014.
- The State Police reported 1,222 civilian employees in 2015; a decrease of less than one-half of one percent compared to 1,226 in 2014.
- Sworn personnel accounted for 68 percent and civilians represented 32 percent of the total State Police employees.

# Section Ten

## LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED & ASSAULTED SUMMARY

## POLICE OFFICERS KILLED AND ASSAULTED

The killing or assault of a police officer has a harmful effect on society that reaches far beyond the overt act. Such occurrences constitute an immediate threat to the well-being of the community and serious breach of the internal security of the country. Today, a young person who considers a career in law enforcement must also consider the very strong possibility of being killed or assaulted by a member of the very same society they are sworn to protect. This deplorable situation should be a subject of serious concern, for in truth, an attack on a police officer is an attack on society. The violence directed against law enforcement officers acting in the line of duty is clearly demonstrated by the following information.

#### POLICE FELONIOUSLY KILLED

• In 2015, there were no police officers feloniously killed while in the performance of their duties.

## **ASSAULTS ON POLICE OFFICERS**

Police assault statistics are important to the police administrator who attempts to identify the causative factors of this type of criminal activity. Many factors contribute to police assaults, and circumstances vary from place to place. Identifying specific reasons for these assaults is therefore extremely difficult. The following information illustrates the frequency of these events, and any attempt at analysis of these assaults should include consideration of the unique variables present in each jurisdiction. Due to the broad range of services performed by many state and county police agencies, no assault rates are computed for total police officers.

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

• There were 1,735 police officers assaulted in 2015, a decrease of 3 percent when compared to 2014.

#### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**

- Thirty-one percent (541) of the officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Physical Force, such as hands, fists and feet, was used in 89 percent (1,540) of all police assaults.
- Thirty-four percent of police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Thirteen percent of the assaults on police officers occurred during the 2-hour period of 8:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m.

#### CLEARANCES

• The police of New Jersey were successful in clearing in 91 percent of the assaults directed at them.

#### **ASSAULTS ON MUNICIPAL POLICE OFFICERS**

#### VOLUME/RATE/TREND

- A total of 1,539 municipal police officers were assaulted during 2015, a decrease of 5 percent when compared to 2014.
- The assault rate for every 100 municipal officers was 7.8, a 5 percent decrease compared to 2014.

#### **ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS**


- Twenty-eight percent of the municipal officers assaulted sustained injury.
- Physical Force, such as hands, fists and feet, was used in 88 percent (1,357) of all police assaults.
- Thirty-seven percent of the municipal police assaults occurred when officers responded to disturbance calls.
- Attempting Other Arrests accounted for 11 percent of the municipal police assaults.

#### **OTHER POLICE OFFICERS ASSAULTED**

The following law enforcement agencies are handled separately and are not included when computing municipal assault rates; the services performed by these agencies vary greatly from the functions of municipal police agencies.


- County law enforcement agencies reported 22 police officers assaulted with 13 sustaining injury.
- The New Jersey State Police reported 22 police officers assaulted with 1 sustaining injury.
- Other state agencies with police powers reported 127 police officers assaulted with 85 sustaining injury.
- University and college police agencies reported 25 police officers assaulted with 11 sustaining injury.

## **GLOSSARY OF TERMS**

ADULT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person aged 18 or over.
AMERICAN INDIAN or	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America, and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.
ALASKAN NATIVE	
ARREST RATE	The number of arrests for Part I and Part II offenses for each unit of population, generally per 1,000.
ASIAN or PACIFIC ISLANDER	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example: China, India, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, and Samoa.
BLACK	A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa, characterized by dark skin pigmentation.
CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the solution to a particular crime, usually by the arrest of the offender.
CLEARED BY ARREST	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared when the offender has been identified, sufficient evidence has been obtained to formally charge and the offender has been ordered to appear in court.
CRIME INDEX	The total of the seven major offenses used to measure the extent, fluctuation and distribution of crime in a geographical area. The following crimes make up the index: Murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft; these offenses are referred to as Index offenses.
CRIME RATE	The number of Index offenses reported for each unit of population per 1,000.
CRIMES AGAINST PERSONS	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, and aggravated assault.
CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY	Consists of the following Index offenses: Robbery, burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.
DAY	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
ETHNIC ORIGIN	Having or originating from linguistic or cultural ties with a specific group.
EXCEPTIONAL CLEARANCE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, an offense is cleared exceptionally when an offender has been identified or located and sufficient evidence to charge has been obtained, but there is some reason beyond police control that prohibits the offender from being brought before the court.
HIERARCHY RULE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, each crime or attempted crime is counted in only one offense category. If several offenses are committed, simply glance down the list of Part I offenses and stop at the first offense recognized from the facts given; this offense is the correct classification for this criminal activity.
HISPANIC	A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
JUVENILE	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, a person under the age of 18.
JUVENILE CLEARANCE	Those crimes where the offenders are identified as juveniles.
NIGHT	For Uniform Crime Reporting purposes, the hours from 6:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m.
NONVIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Burglary, larceny-theft, and motor vehicle theft.

POPULATION	Is the year-round population of the municipality shown in the most recent State population estimates published by the Department of Labor, except that in the year of promulgation of a Federal decennial census, the census figures shall be used.
RESORT MUNICIPALITY	Is a municipality which, because of its recreational, entertainment or amusement characteristics or facilities or its close proximity to such characteristics or facilities, experiences a total increase during the seasonal period in the number of persons temporarily resident therein of 25 percent or more of its population.
SEASONAL POPULATION	Is the average of the estimated number of persons temporarily resident in the municipality during the three consecutive months when the temporary population is greatest.
TEMPORARY RESIDENT	Means the occupying for any period of time during the seasonal period by any person not counted as a resident of the municipality for population purposes of an accommodation in a rented residential unit or vacation home.
UNFOUNDED	Classification of reported crimes that are found to be false or baseless.
VIOLENT CRIME	Consists of the following Index offenses: Murder, rape, robbery, and aggravated assault.
WHITE	A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East.

#### **CALCULATIONS OF RATES AND TRENDS**

1. Crime Rate per 1,000 inhabitants: This represents the number of Index offenses per 1,000 inhabitants. For example: What is the crime rate for a municipality with 513 Index offenses (murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor vehicle theft), with a population of 8,280?

513 (Index offenses)  $\div$  8,280 (population) = .061957 x 1,000 = 62.0 (crime per 1,000 inhabitants)

2. Crime Trend: A crime trend shows the extent to which crime increased or decreased. This is done by comparing a period of the current year with the same period of a previous year. For example: A municipality experienced 264 Index offenses in a previous year and 513 Index offenses in the current year. What is the percent of the increase?

513 (current year Index offenses) -264 (previous year Index offenses) = 249 (numerical increase) 249 (numerical increase)  $\div 264$  (previous year)  $= .943 \times 100 = +94\%$  (percent change)

NOTE: If there were more Index offenses in a previous year than in the current year, we would have a percentage decrease.

**3.** Number of Police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants: This is calculated in the same manner as a crime rate. For example: A municipality with a population of 8,280 and 28 police personnel. How many officers are there per 1,000 population?

28 (police personnel)  $\div$  8,280 (population) = .00338 x 1,000 = 3.4 (police personnel per 1,000 inhabitants)

NOTE: This formula can be applied to either total police personnel or just police officers per 1,000 inhabitants.

**4. Police Assaulted Rate:** This is calculated at a rate per 100 police officers. For example: A municipality with 25 officers had five of them assaulted during the month. What is the police assaulted rate?

5 (police officers assaulted)  $\div$  25 (police officers) = .2 x 100 = 20 (police assaulted per 100 officers)

- **5. Clearance Rate:** This refers to the percent of Index offenses cleared (solved), over a specific period of time. For example: A municipality with 513 Index offenses in a chosen time frame, cleared 95 of these offenses. What is the clearance rate?
  - 95 (Index offenses cleared)  $\div$  513 (Index offenses) = .185 x 100 = 18 .5 (percent cleared)
- 6. Annual Mean Population: Is determined for each municipality designated a resort municipality by use of the following formula:

$$AMP = \frac{12P + 3SP}{12}$$

Where **AMP** equals Annual Mean Population; **P** equals Population; **SP** equals Seasonal Population.

**7. Density per Square Mile:** The population density is calculated as population divided by total land area (1,000 people in a square mile).

Density Per Square Mile = Estimated Population / Area in Square Miles
